PROLOGUE

The Jewellery Section of the Ethnographic Museum of Assam Institute of Research for Tribals and Scheduled Castes is an exquisite section. This section houses exquisite collection of ethnic jewellery of various tribes of Assam. They are showcased in a gallery which have recently been renovated and upgraded..

Jewellery are integral part of human culture. Every social group have their own unique patterns of ornaments which they use to fulfil their sense of beauty and also religio-magical requirements. Apart from their physical values acquired through the inputs used, all these also have aesthetic values and each tribe take pride in possessing such assets. Many of the tribes also identify themselves through the use of some of their uniquely designed jewellery. The ornaments used by tribes are of various shapes and sizes having various uses. Some are in the form of rings, necklace, bracelets, anklets, armlets, toe-rings etc., while there are also cute leg-ring, elbow ring, head gear, nose ring etc. The most notable fact of these jewellery is that these are all indigenously designed and crafted with hard labour and devotion. These are all handmade and are gradually losing ground to the machine made finer ornaments.

The present volume is the first handbook of its kind, taken up by the Institute for publication. The basic objective behind this publication was to present the museum before the people who live beyond the State and side by side, the documentation of the items. All attempts have been made to corroborate facts and information relating to the design of the ornaments. In that sense this is an exclusive handbook of this museum.


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

◆ Necklace of coins. The coins have designed silver loops at one edge for attaching with the black strand. Used by Hajong women.


◆Amber beads of various shapes symmetrically woven in one thread. Note the diametrically opposite location and shape of three beads in the necklace. Used by Hmar women.

Used by Dimasa women in festivals.



◆An amber ear stud bordered with thin gold plates at the bottom. The upper surface is embellished with floral design in local ruby (dalimi bakhor) and gold plate. Used by old ladies as ear plug among the Assamese, Sonowal Kachari and Singpho communities.
