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A BRIEF NOTE ON

INTEGRATED TRIBAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY, P.T.G.(CHENCHU), SUNDIPENTA, KURNOOL DISTRICT

Of the 33 Scheduled Tribes of Andhra Fradesh, (8) tribal groups have been recognised as Primitive Tribal Groups by Government The extremely backward tribal groups who are identified Primitive Tribal Groups are at the pre-agricultural stage of economy, low level of literacy and largely subsisting on food gathering and The identification of some tribal groups as P.T.Gs. by Government of India was done in three different periods for the purpose of extending additional Special Central Assistance to implement special "This compensatory preference" is essential to bring the isolated and Primitive Groups on par with other advanced groups. Chenchu tribe was recognised as Primitive Tribal Group in 1975. These Chenchus are mainly inhabiting the districts of Mahabubnagar, Prakasam, Kurnool, Guntur, Nalgonda and Ranga Reddy. The Kolams of Adilabad District and Konda Reddis of East Godavari, West Godavari and Khammam Districts were recognised as P.T.Gs. in the year 1980 and Konda Savaras. Gadabas, Khonds, Porjas of Srikakulam, Vizianagaram and Visakhapatnam Districts and Thotis of Adilabad District in the year 1983.

Keeping in view the multifarious problems of the Chenchus, I.T.D.A., for Primitive Tribal Group (Chenchu), was established during 1975-76 for their alround development with its headquarters at Hyderabad. This I.T.D.A. was registered under Societies Registration Act, 1869. The Director of Tribal Welfare is the Ex-officio Chairman of the Project. The headquarters of the I.T.D.A. was shifted from Hyderabad to Srisailam on 1.8.1988.

The Integrated Tribal Development Agency for P.T.G. (Chenchu) started functioning with its headquarters at Sundipenta-Srisailam, Kurnool Dist. from August, 1st, 1988 exclusively for the socio economic development of Chenchus, predominantly inhabitating Nallamalai hills. Srisailam is centrally located for the entire continguous Chenchu region of Nallamalai hills extending over nearly 3,500 Sq.Kms. The jurisdiction of the I.T.D.A., extends over six (6) districts namely Mahabubnagar, Prakasam, Kurnool, Guntur, Nalgonda and Ranga Reddy.

The estimated Chenchu population in the Project area of all the (6) districts is 29,600. Mahaboobnagar district stands first in the strength of Chenchu population followed by Prakasam District. The District-wise number of Mandals and Chenchugudems in the I.T.D.A. Area is shown hereunder.

NAGARJUNASAGAR - SRISAILAM SANCTUARY : (RAJIV GANDHI TIGER RESERVE)

The Sanctuary was established in the year 1983 which is spread over 5 districts of this I.T.D.A. namely Mahabubnagar, Prakasam, Kurnool, Guntur and Nalgonda with the total area of 3568 Sq. Kms. The great river Krishna is meandering through the sanctuary area dividing the forest area from Kurnool to Mahabubnagar, Prakasam and Guntur Districts.

SCHEDULED VILLAGES IN THE I.T.D.A. AREA :

Out of 6 districts of the I.T.D.A. area Scheduled Villages are found only in Mahabubnagar District. These are declared as Scheduled villages under the Scheduled Areas (PART-B States) Order, 1950 New Delhi, 7th December, 1950 under the Fifth Schedule of the Constitution of India.

The I.T.D.A. is headed by Project Officer who is assisted by (1) Development Officer and other field staff.

The implementation of Chenchu development programmes in Mahabubnagar and Nalgonda Districts is being done by Project Officer, MADA & PTG., Mannanur, Mahabubnagar District and Nalgonda respectively. The Revenue Divisional Officer, Vikarabad, Ranga Reddy District is designated as Asst. Project Officer, Chenchu Development in Ranga Reddy District. The District Tribal Welfare officers of Kurnool, Guntur and Prakasam are also designated as Asst. Project Officers (Chenchu) to assist the Project Officer in identifying the Chenchu beneficiaries and implementing the programme in their respective districts. ENGINEERING DIVISION ==

With a view to implement works Programme for the Chenchus in the I.T.D.A. area one Engineering Division (Tribal Welfare) located at Hyderabad has been shifted to Srisailam and it started functioning at Srisailam from 2.4.1989. The Engineering Divsion is headed by Executive Engineer and he is assisted by 4 Deputy Executive Engineers and other technical and ministerial staff for the speedy implementation of the works programme. GIRIJAN CO-OPERATIVE CORPORATION, SRISAILAM:

Basing on the recommendations of the Managing Director, Girijan Co-operative Corporation Limited, Visakhapatnam, the Board of Directors of the Corporation had ordered for shifting the office of the Divisional Manager, Girijan Co-operative Corporation from Nandyal to Srisailam Project as it is a central place for the Chenchugudems of Mahabubnagar, Prakasam, Kurnool and Guntur Districts.

The Divisional Manager's Office started functioning from 1-4-1989 with Branch Offices at Mannanur, Mahabubnagar Dist. and Pedda Dornala Prakasam Dist. exculusively covering the chenchu region. A new sub division has been opened at Nandyal, Kurnool Dist. on 1.4.1990: covering two rayalaseema Districts namely Kurnool and Ananthapur.

The following are the main functions of the Girijan Cooperative Corporation.

- 1. Purchase of Minor Forest Produces and Agricultural produce from the Chenchus at fair prices.
- 2. Sale of D.Rs to the Chenchus and other tribals.
- 3. Supply of food provisions, cosmetics etc., to the Ashram Schools and Hostels in the Districts of Mahabubnagar, Prakasam, Kurnool and Guntur.
- 4. Sanction of Agricultural credit and consumption credit to Chenchus.

DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES

I. EDUCATION:

The literacy among the chenchus is awefully low i.e., 9.7% (1991 Census). The Policy of Government is to ensure cent precent literacy among S.Ts. With a view to achieve this avowed objective a good number of educational institutions are functioning and allied facilities are provided to the Chenchus of this I.T.D.A. The following types of educational institutions are functioning for the benefit of Chenchus.

- 1. Ashram Schools
- 2. Single Teacher Schools
- 3. Hostels
- 4. Residential Schools
- 5. Community Schools
- 6. Best Available Schools.

TRAINING CUM DRESS MAKING CENTRE

This I.T.D.A., is also running a Training Cum Dress making Centre with embrodiary and activities like preparation of plastic goods at Appaipalli, Mahabubnagar District. Every year 20-25 Chenchu women are trained in this centre. Each trainee is paid Rs.200/~ per month as stipend and the duration of the course is 10 months. The Instructor and Attender of the Centre are also Chenchus.

The two pairs of dresses to be provided to the students of 60 single teacher schools every year are stitched in this centre.

After completing training each trainee will be provided with a sewing machine and accessories on full subsidy basis as per the approved scheme to pursue the profession independently.

SPECIAL HOSTEL

A Special Hostel is run by this I.T.D.A., as per the Govt. Order Rt. No. 579 S.W. (E1) Dept., dt. 13.7.1994 and as per D.O.Lr.No.D2/7637/94, dt. 8.8.94 of Commissioner of Tribal Welfare, A.P., Hyderabad for the Chenchu students studying in colleges. There are 16 Chenchu students in this hostel of whom 12 students are studying in Inter Ist year, 2 in Inter IInd Year and 2 in Degree Course.

TRAINING PROGRAMMES ORGANISED FOR THE EDUCATED AND UNEMPLOYED CHENCHU YOUTH :-

As a part of training programme, various programmes are being organised by this I.T.D.A., for the benefit of educated unemployed youth as detailed below:

AGRICULTURE AND ALLIED SCHEMES :-

The food gathering and hunting Chenchus are now slowly settling in Agriculture. About 30% of chenchus are now depending on Agriculture, cultivating forest enclosures, assigned lands and private lands purchased and assigned to them.

Under Agriculture sector the following schemes are implemented.

- a) Land development and ploughing
- b) Supply of plough bullocks.
- c) Supply of Agricultural implements.
- d) Supply of bullock carts
- e) Supply of seeds and pesticides
- f) Supply of hand operated and power sprayers to control the posts
- g) Tractors have also been supplied to chenchu Associations of Peddamanthanala, Chintala and Garapenta chenchugudems to help them to undertake intensive cultivation and transportation there by to improve their levels of livelihood.

AGRICULTURAL ACTIVITIES DURING KHARIFF 1995

I.T.D.A. Srisailam is undertaking every year supply of agricultural inputs like seeds and pesticides and financing land ploughing and seed sowing activities in the lands of chenchus of Prakasam, Kurnool and Guntur district. This year, it has been decided to extend this activity to Mahabubnagar district also thus covering all the four districts of major concentration of chenchu population. The extent of land under cultivation and requirement of seed was assessed by conducting a village wise survey by sectoral officers.

PLOUGHING OF LANDS :-

The Director of Tribal Welfare has instructed that ploughing and sowing activity is to be restricted to 2 Acres per beneficiary and that only 4 to 5 villages for each Agricultural Officer, so that close monitoring could be done and results achieved.

Accordingly land ploughing and sowing of seed has been takenup in 49 villages with 3955 Acres of land benefitting 1806 families. Due to heavy demand from the chenchus, of various villages to extend this benefit for them, slightly higher extent of land has been taken up under this scheme. However on an average the extent of land per beneficiary works out to 2.19 Acres only. For ploughing of land in above villages, Quotation cum tenders were called for from the tractor owners in respective mandals of four districts and after negotiations on least quoted rate, a final rate of Rs.345/- per acre for plough and Rs.145/- per acre for cultivator has been fixed and work orders were issued with details of villages, extent of land to be ploughed and number of beneficiaries. For sowing, a rate of Rs.100/oer acre has been fixed. In all these villages V.T.D.As have been formed joint bank accounts opened. Payment of charges for ploughing sowing are being paid to the V.T.D.As after receiving beneficiary wise acquittances from V.T.D.As through concerned Agricultural Officers or other sectoral officers kept incharge of this activity.

Till now an extent of 3955 acres has been ploughed and sown with different varieties of seeds supplied by this I.T.D.A. An amount of Rs.18.505 lakhs has been spent on ploughing and sowing activity.

The details of District wise extent of land ploughed, land sown, and number of beneficiaries with expenditure in 4 districts are furnished in Annexure-I.

SUPPLY OF SEED :

the requirement of seed has been arrived at by conducting a survey in various chenchugudems of four districts and seed has been procured from A.P.State Seeds Development Corporation, Kurnool and Hyderabad and from A.P.Oil Seeds Growers Cooperative Federation, Hyderabad (only Groundnut seed). It has been decided to supply seed to all chenchugudems where land is being cultivated. The details of seed procured, seed allotted to Agricultural Officers and seed distributed are furnished in Annexure-II. The total cost of all varieties of seeds procured accounts for Rs.12.63 lakhs. (in cluding transportation charges.

BACKYARD VEGETABLE GARDENS :

As per the instructions of the Director of Tribal Welfare, vegetable mini kits have been supplied to chenchu families in four districts with a view to improve the nutritional standards of their diet. Minikits have also been supplied to various Ashram Schools. Each Mini kit contains the following improved varieties of Vegetable seeds.

3000 kits have been procured and distributed to chenchu families at one kit per family and to Ashram Schools at 5 to 10 kits per school.

MINOR IRRIGATION SECTOR:

Under this sector the following schemes are implemented.

- a) Providing Open wells
- b) Providing Bore wells
- c) Renovation of Old wells
- d) Supply of Oil engines and electrical motors
- e) Supply of P.V.C. Pipes.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY SECTOR:

a) Milch Animals, Sheep and Goat units are being supplied under this sector.
b) Pisci Culture:

Under this scheme fish seed is supplied to be grown in tanks and also nets, cycles are supplied to the Chenchus who are living on either side of river Krishna who are engaged in fishing.

MEDICAL & HEALTH FACILITIES:

The State Government is releasing an amount of Rs.5.00 lakhs every year to this ITDA under Implact Money to spend for medical purpose in all the 6 Districts for the following programmes.

- 1) Conducting medical camps in Chenchugudems.
- Referal cases-expenditure on special medicines and to and fro charges, Special diet for cases referred to District Headquarters/State head quarters Hospitals.
- 3) Providing medicines to the chenchu patients on the basis of prescriptions given by the local Govt. Doctors.

- 4) Expediture in the cases of wild life victims such as drugs, transportation charges, special diet, etc.
- 5) Fuel charges of Mobile Medical unit at Dornala and Mannanur as and when requested by the Medical Officers and other P.H.Cs for touring the chenchugudmes and attending their medical needs. The Impact Money is released to Dist. Tribal Welfare Officers/Project Officers of concerned districts for meeting the expenditure on above schemes.

This I.T.D.A. is also pursuing the district Medical and Health Oficers for conducting immunization programmes in chenchugudems of this I.T.D.A.

DRINKING WATER:

Drinking water bore wells are provided in the Chenchugudmes, meeting the expenditure from A.W.S./R.W.S.Schemes provided to the Executive Engineer (Tribal Welfare), Srisailam and through Panchayat Raj Department of respective districts. About 90% of the Chenchugudems are provided with drinking water bore wells.

This I.T.D.A. is co-ordinating the work with Executive Engineer, Tribal Welfare and Panchayat Raj Department of respective districts.

PERMANENT HOUSING PROGRAMME UNDER JRY (IAY FOR CHENCHUS):

During the year 1991, 2000 houses have been constructed for the Chenchus in Mahabubnagar, Prakasam, Kurnool and Guntur Districts @ 500 houses for each district for the year 1995-96. 1000 houses havae been sanctioned for the Chenchus of Mahabubnagar District and 115 houses in 3 Chenchugudems of Prakasam District under I.A.Y. scheme.

ACTION PLAN 1995-96:

The physical and financial allocations for the year 1995-96 are 7235 families and Rs.8,00,54,650 lakhs respectively including IFAD Programme. The District-wise allocations are given in Annexure III.

THE ANDHRA PRADESH PARTICIPATORY TRIBAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT (APPTDP):

The Andhra Pradesh Participatory Tribal Development Project (APPTDP) with the prime objective of creating food security to tribal families and to istill self reliance and confidence in them in acting for their own development is being implemented in the I.T.D.A. chenchu areas for a period of 7 years begining from 1994-95.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES

- 1. Raise income levels, ensure food security and improve the quality of life of the Tribals within the context of the traditional tribal environment, culture and values.
- 2. Promote greater self reliance amongst Communities on a sustainable basis, and
- 3 to reduce and reverse degradation of the environment.

The Project is financed by the International Fund for Agricultural Development, Rome; NABARD, Government of India, Government of Andhra Pradesh and co-financed by Netherlands The identified Project area in I.T.D.A. for P.T.G. (Chenchu) Sundipenta covers 242 villages/Chenchugudems spread over 33 Mandals in 6 districts of Mahabubnagar, Prakasam, Kurnool, Guntur, Nalgonda and Ranga Reddy. The Project is aimed at benefitting 5,070 families with 25,345 population with a total financial outlay of Rs.7,96 crores. The Annual work financing plan for the first year 1994-95 has been prepared with a target of 1306 families and Rs.112.665 lakhs 24 villages in the districts of Mahabubnagar, Prakasam and Kurnool have identified to be covered in the first year 1994-95. For the year 1995-96 48 villages have been identified in all the six districts to be covered under APPTDP with a total financial allocation of lakhs. As the programme coudn't be started last year, all the 72 villages/will be covered during this year.

villages 8 Multi-disciplinary teams each one consisting of Agriculture, Horticulture and Engineering personnel have been constituted and each M.D.T. is allotted a group of 9 to 14 contiguous villages. In ald, these villages Village Tribal Development Associations (VTDA's) have be organised and Joint Bankaccounts have been formed in the names of President and Secretary of the V.T.D.A. Financial sanctions under various schemes under APPTDP in these villages will be released to the concerned Joint Bank accounts and the schemes will be implemented through the V.T.D.As with the participation of the beneficiaries. One village liaison worker has been selected for the village or one for two or three villages depending on the size of the village. They are being trained on the process of implementation of various programmes under APPTDP.

ACHIEVEMENTS OF I.T.D.A., SRISAILAM

FROM 01-4-95 TO 30-11-95

I. A.P.P.T.D.P. (IFAD-PHASE II):-

1. GENERAL PREPARATION :-

- -- 72 Villages have been identified for the year 94-95 & 95-96 (24+48 = 72) for I.F.A.D. works.
- -- PRA exercise conducted in all the villages through Multidisciplinary teams and schemes identified.
- -- Village Tribal Development Agencies (VTDAs) have been formed in 68 villages out of 72, so far. Efforts are on to complete formation of VTDAs in remaining villages (i.e., 04)
- -- Joint Bank Accounts were opened in 68 villages.
- -- 40 village liason workers were identified through V.T.D.As.

 They all to be trained shortly.
- -- Village Liason Workers choosen @ one each for 40 families.
- The selected villages Presidents, Secretaries & Village Liason Workers of Kurnool District were taken on study tour to ITDA Areas of R.C.Varam, Paderu, Parvathipuram & Seethampet where IFAD Phase I is in progress in August 95 to make them aware of implementation of schemes.
- -- The remaining 53 villages VTDA Presidents, Secretaries & Village Liason Workers are going on similar study tour in first fortnight of December'95.
