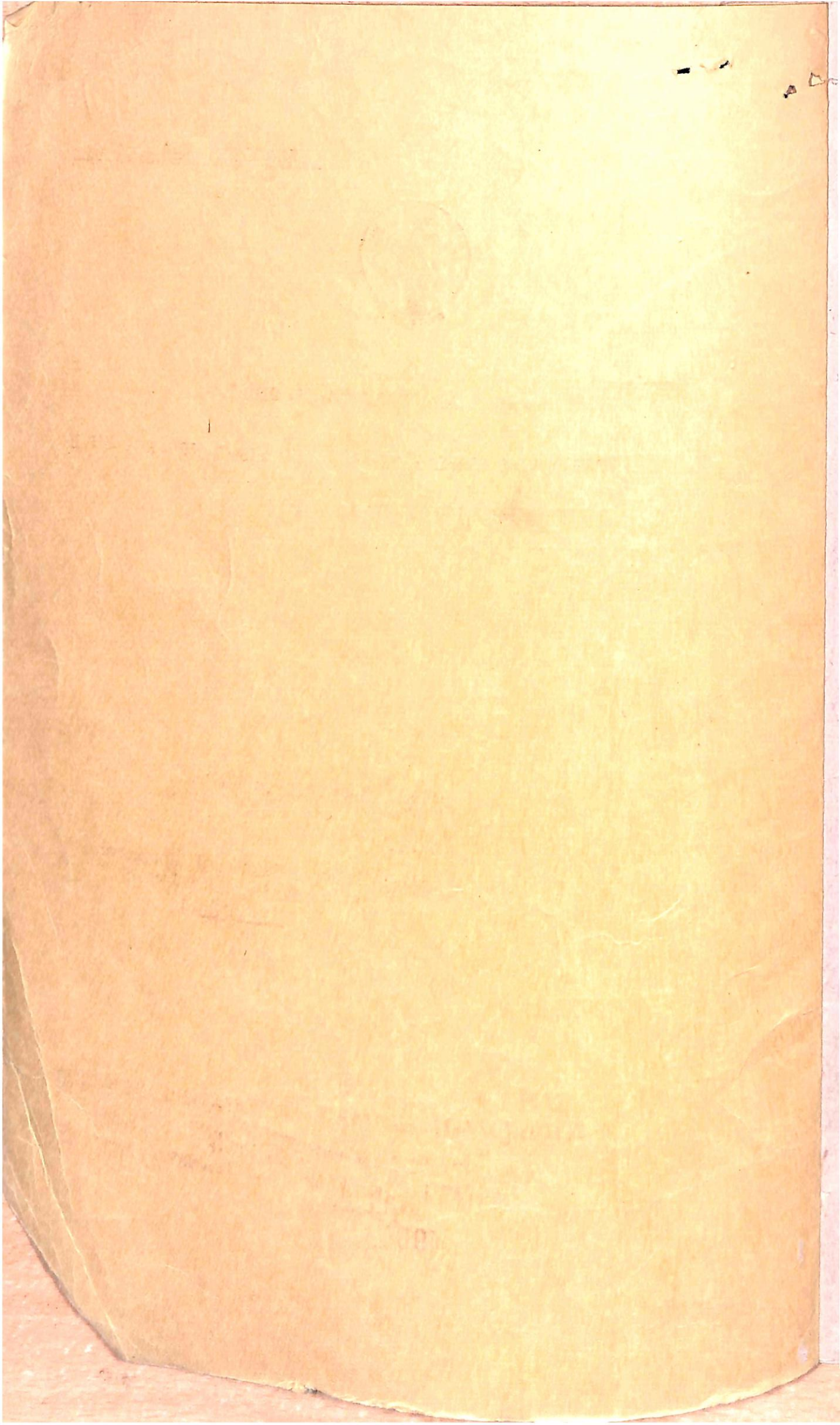

The Administration Report of Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad for the period 1975 - 82 is presented below:

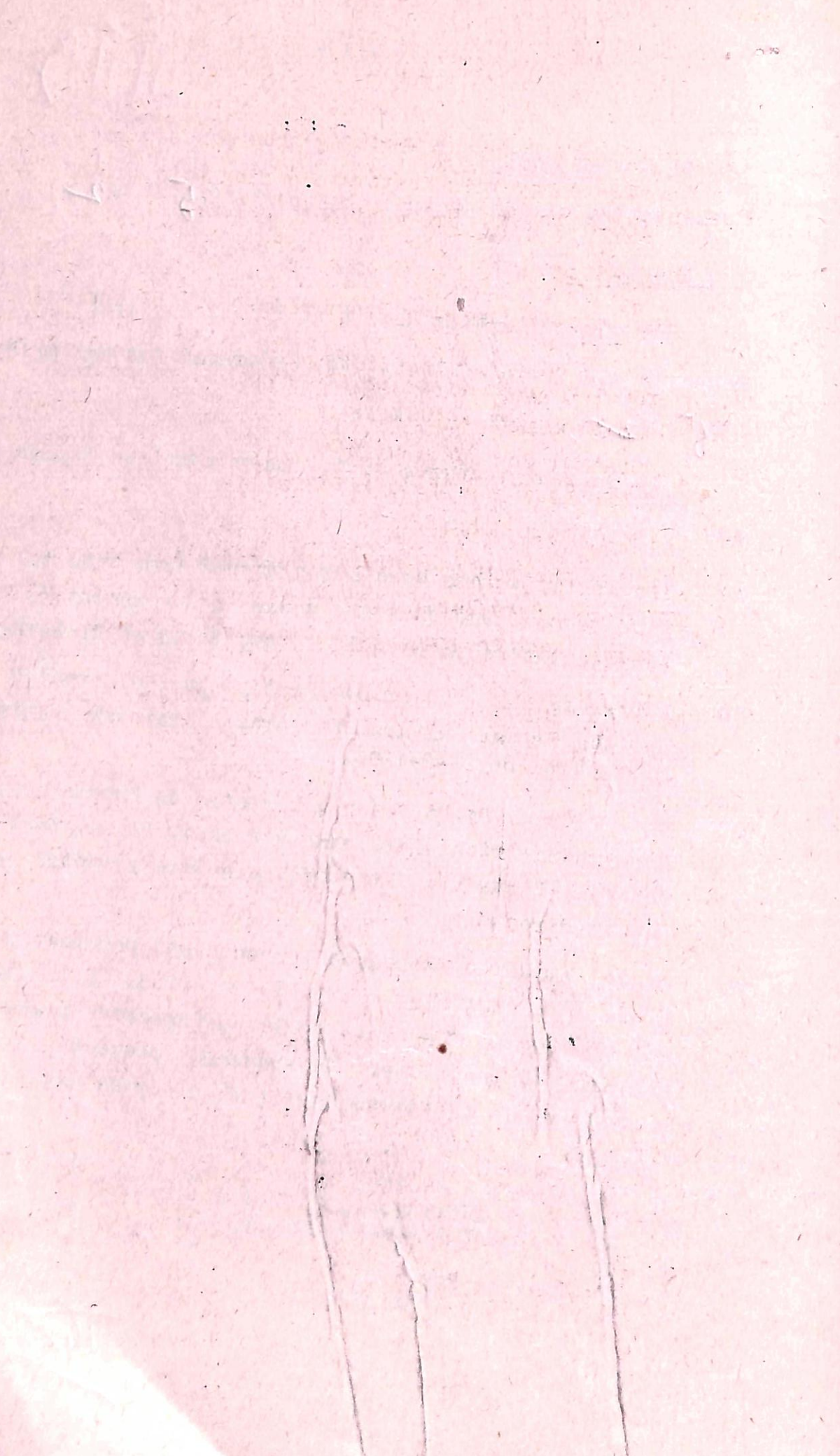
The Salient features of the Administration Report are as follows:

- A) The Institute has been-strengthened from time to time to meet the changing needs of-Government - administration especially in the field of Planning.
- B) During this period Dr.D.R.Pratap was the-Director for the Tribal Cultural Research & Training Institute. He retired on 28-2-1983.
- C) Sri A.Joseph, Dy. Director was posted as Project Officer, Integrated-Tribal Development Agency, Eluru, West Godavari-District. Nine Officers were promoted as Deputy Directors.
- D) A good number of Research Projects and perspective Plans were completed during this period.- I.T.D.As are created on the basis of the perspective plans prepared by Institute. The-research projects completed by the Institute during this period are as follows:-

The Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad has been effectively contributing to the Plans formulations besides undertaking research projects and evaluation studies.

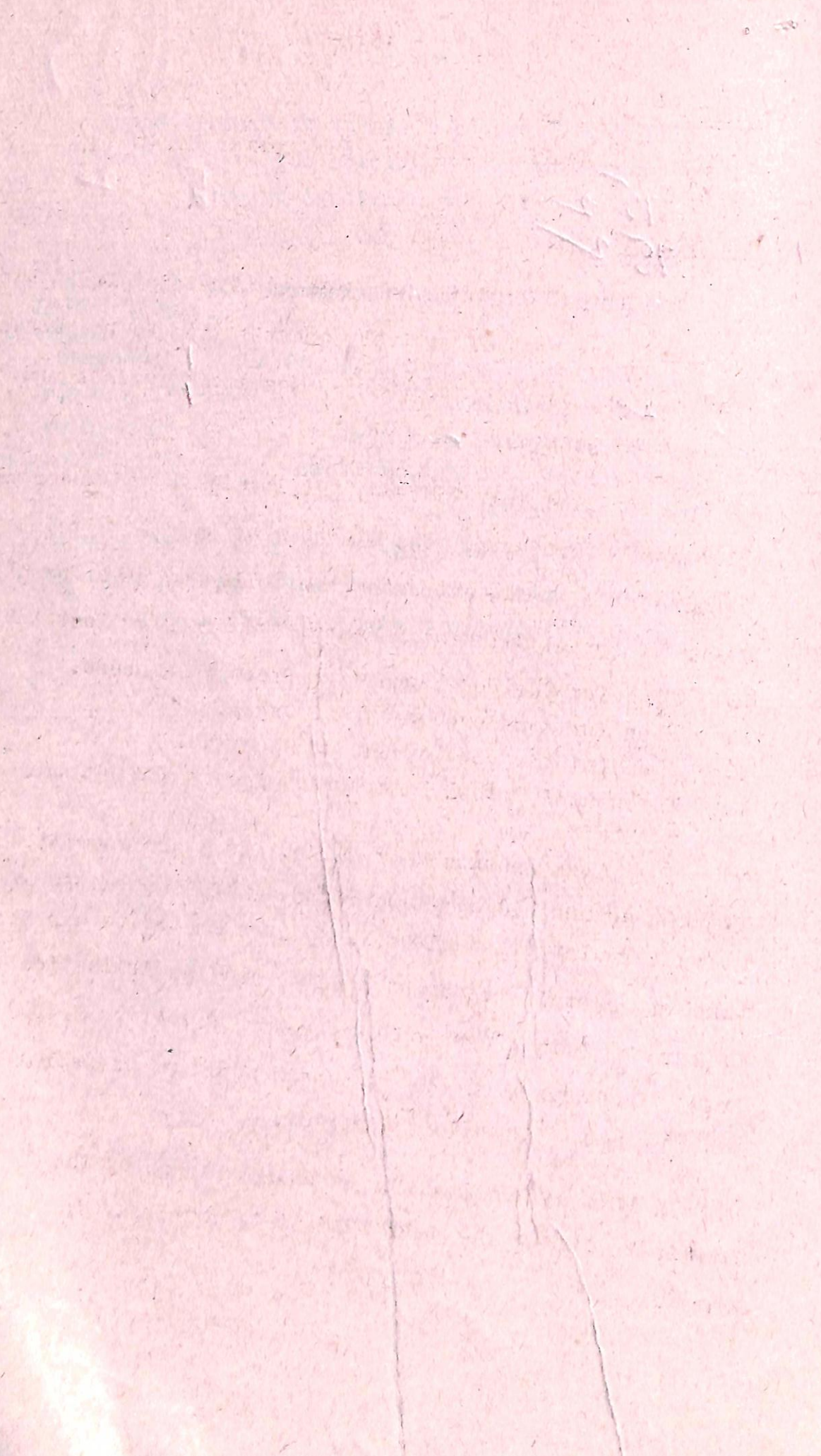

4. Integrated Tribal Development Agency for Nicobar Islands.

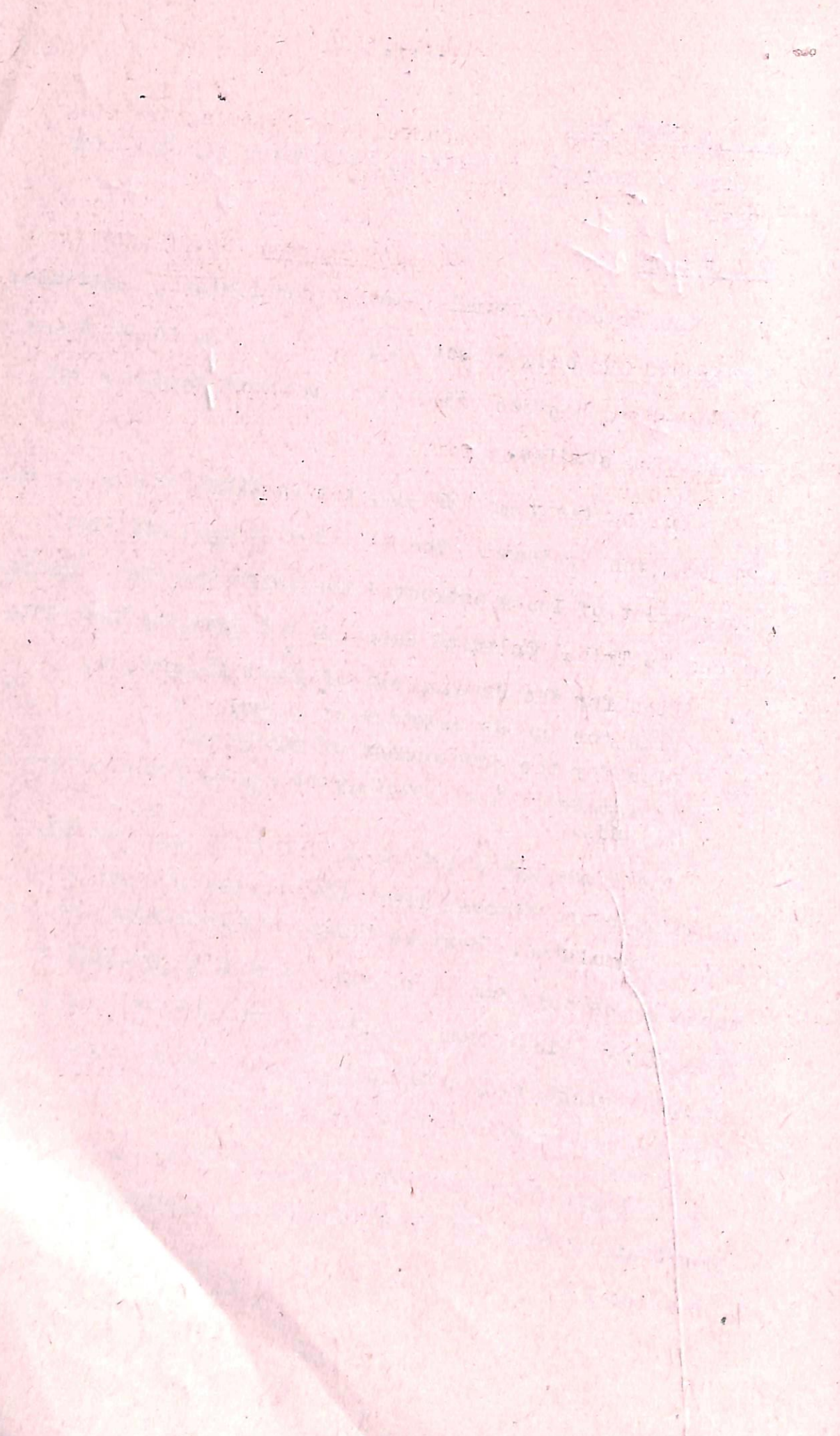

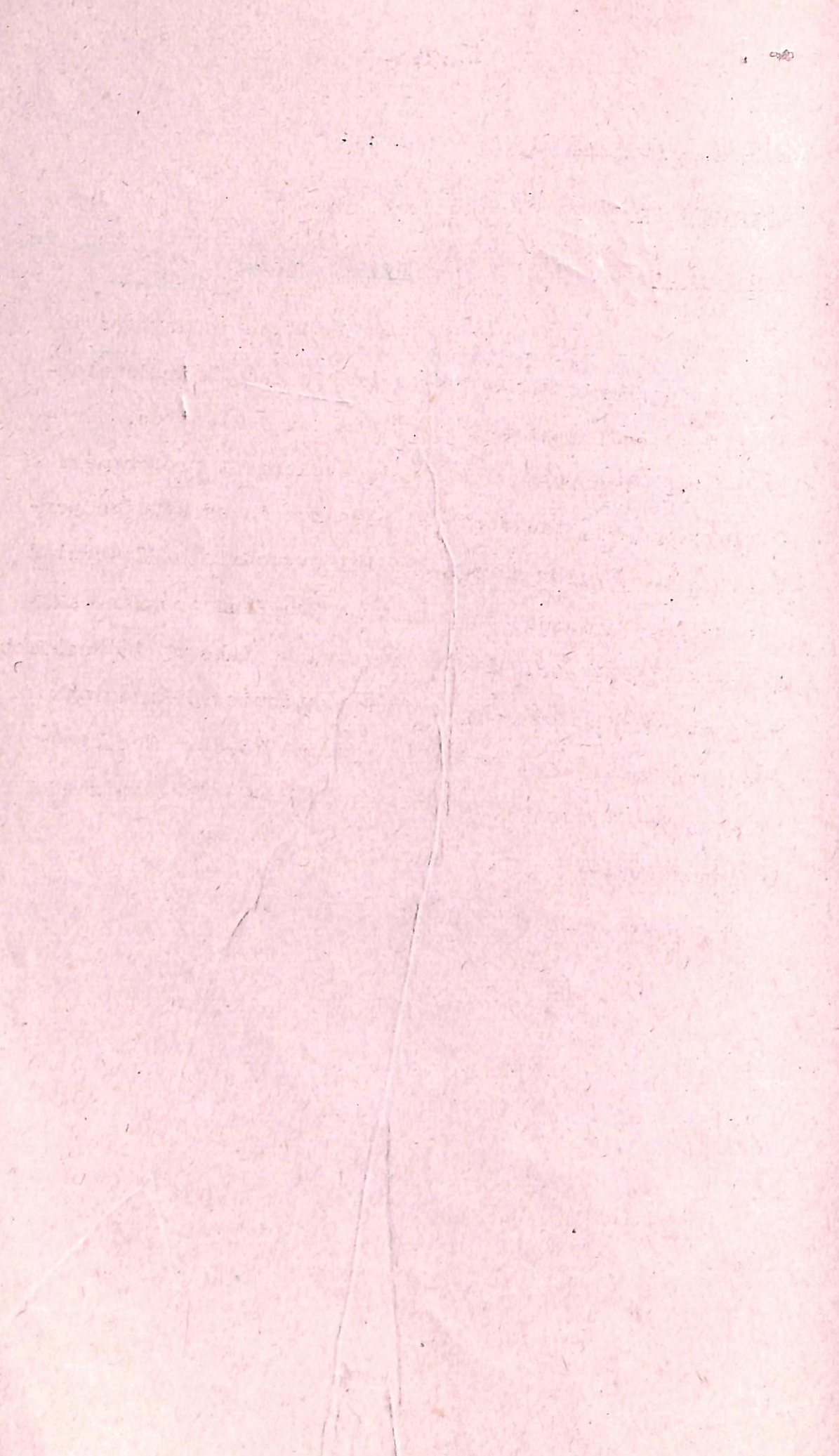

RESEARCH PROJECTS for the year 1984-85:

N o t e s:

The Research wing of the Institute is engaged in conducting various studies on tribes and their development besides formulation of plans and evaluation, monitoring and reporting of tribal development programmes. During 1984-85, the focus of Research is on studies pertaining to popular series, Social structure of Scheduled Tribes, performance assessment of Sub Plan programmes at district level etc. It is proposed to take up 19 Research Projects during 1984-85 besides continuing 3 Research Projects undertaken during the year 1983-84. The list of Research Projects for the year 1984-85 is furnished in Annexure-II.







AGENDA ITEM No.4

Training Programmes for the year 1984-85:

Notes:

The Training Programmes of the Institute comprise Appraisal Courses for Project Officers and Asst. Project Officers and Dist. Officers on Project management and Planning, new strategies etc. The Peripatetic Training Programmes are intended for the benefit of Tribal leaders at Village-level while the Training Programme for standing Committee members is intended for tribal elected leaders at Panchayat Samithi level. It is also proposed to organise 10 Peripatetic Training programmes for tribal leaders, 3 Appraisal Courses for officers and 2 Standing Committee members training for Tribal leaders during 1984-85. 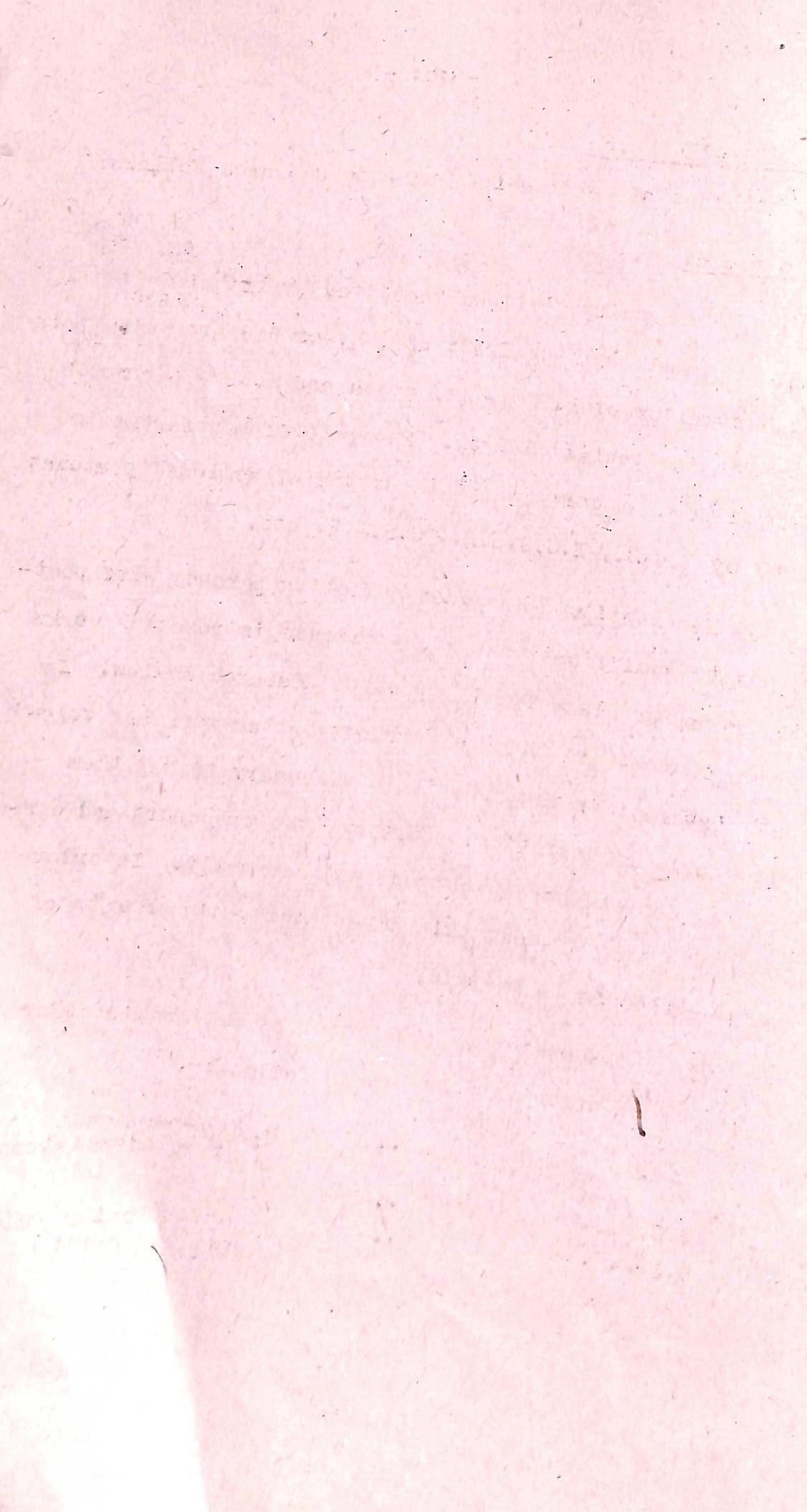

AGENDA ITEM No.6

Enhancement of Fellowship amount to Research Fellows:

Notes:

The Research Fellows recruited by Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad are being paid an honorarium of Rs.500/- per month and Rs.50/- per month towards incidental charges. The rate of honorarium is very less when compared to the rates of fellowship amount paid by U.G.C., I.C.S.S.R., C.S.I.R. etc.

The Institute has been selecting persons with post-graduate qualifications and experience in research work in Tribal problems for the post of Research Fellow. In order to motivate them to turn out better work and tolerate interest in the job, it is necessary to pay them reasonable remuneration. Further, the transport and conveyance charges have also gone up abnormally. In order to enable them to meet this expenditure, higher rate of remuneration is to be paid.

In this connection, the rates of Fellowship offered by different organisations are as follows:-

U.G.C.	..	Rs.900/-per month (A type associateship)
I.C.S.S.R	..	Rs.
C.S.I.R.	..	Rs.800/- (Senior Fellowship per month)



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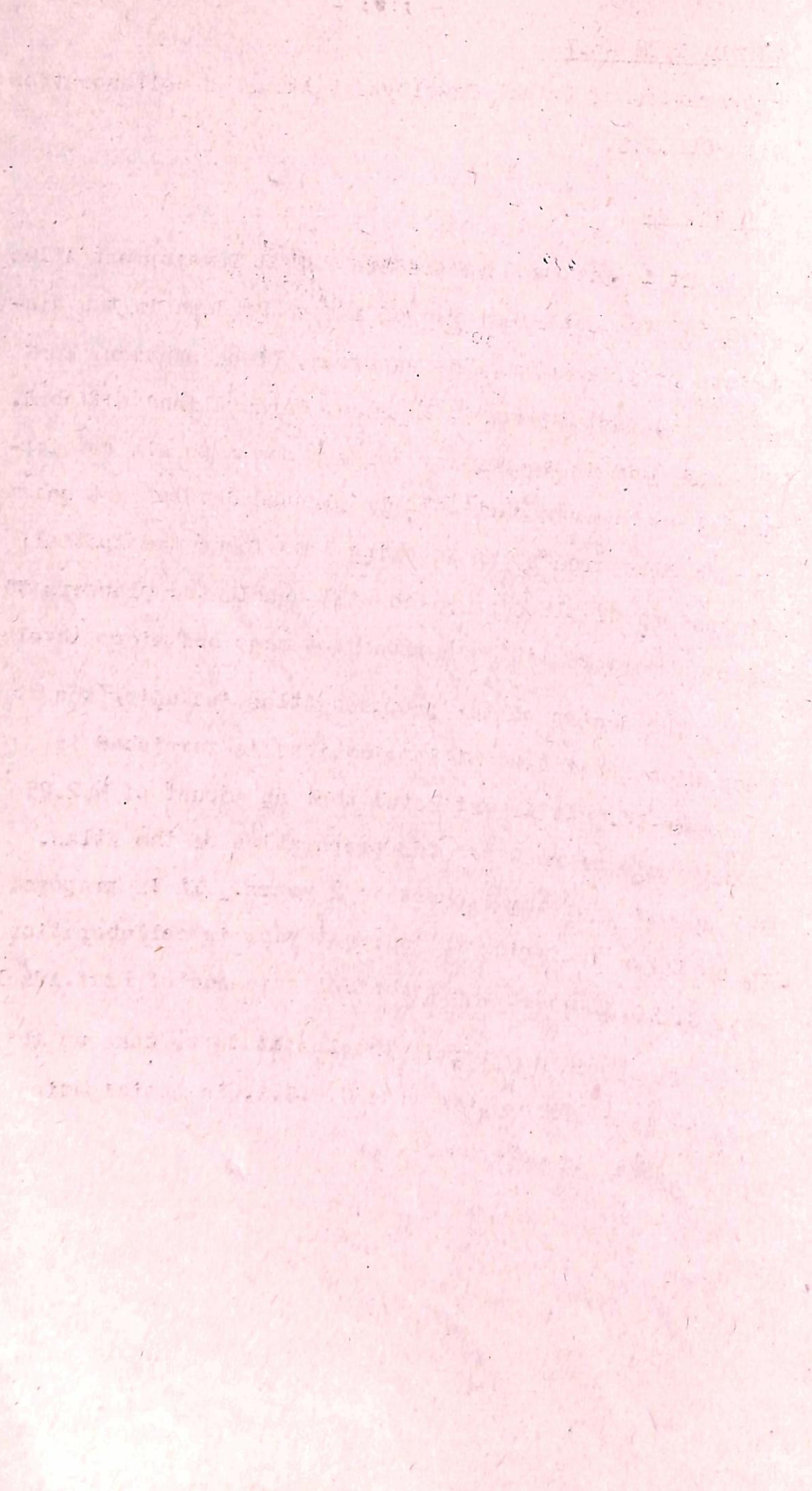
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In view of the circumstances stated above, the Board may consider the enhancement of honorarium to Research Fellows from Rs.550/- to Rs.800/- per month. The Research Fellow also may be paid fixed T.A. of Rs.250/- per month whenever they are deputed for field work.







AGENDA ITEM No.7

Preparation of Tribal Development Atlas in collaboration with C.E.S.S. *Centre for Economic of Social Studies*

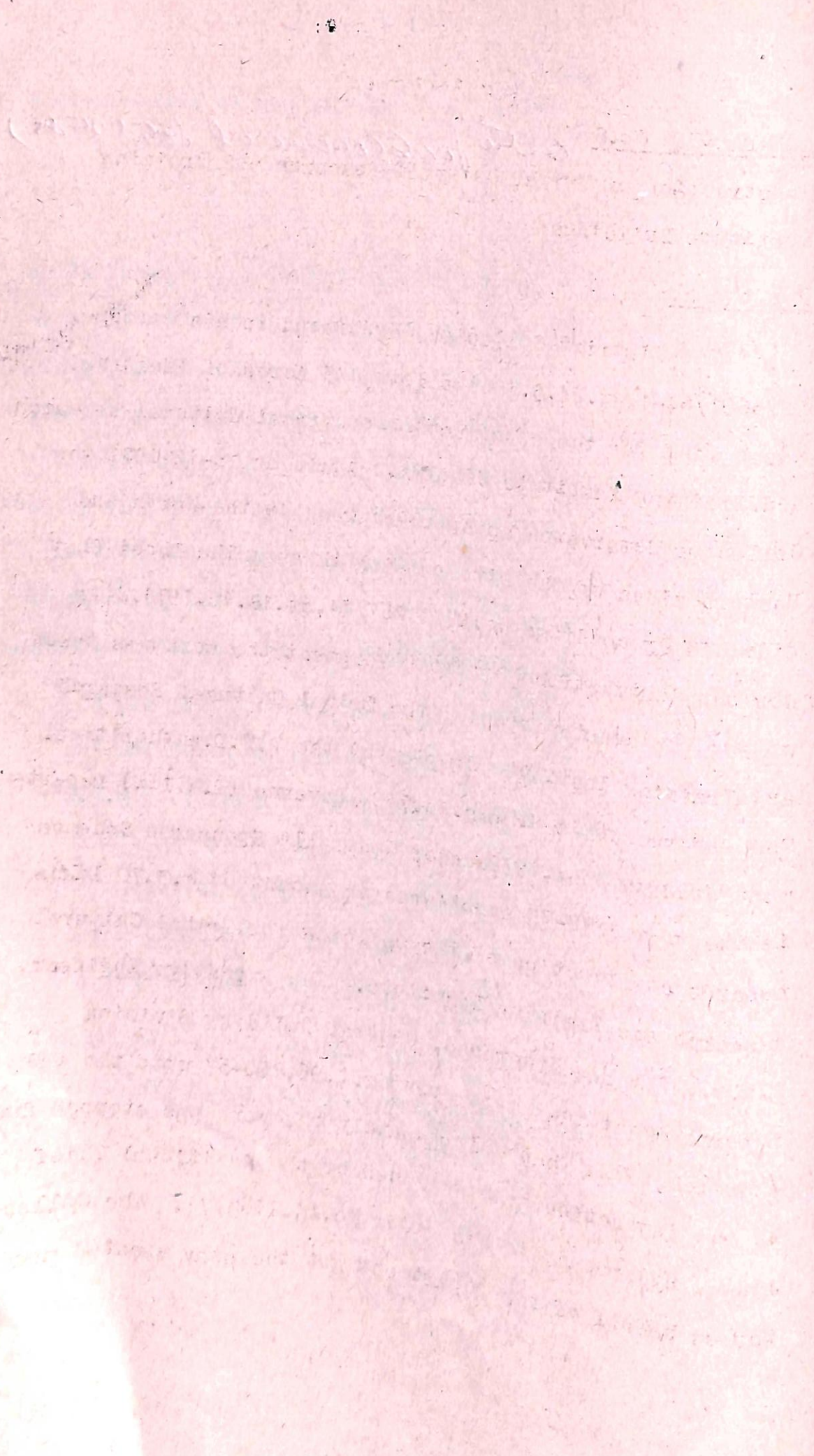
Notes:

It is proposed to prepare Tribal Development Atlas covering the Sub Plan area of Andhra Pradesh in the districts of Srikakulam, Vizianagaram, Visakhapatnam, East Godavari, West Godavari, Khammam, Warangal and Adilabad. The main aim is to portray through the maps all developmental programmes particularly planned development schemes in Sub Plan area so as to bring into focus the spatial dimensions of planning which will enable the planners to adopt a more realistic approach at meso and micro levels.

The design of the proposed Atlas including the mechanics and financial implications is furnished in Annexure-IV. It is estimated that an amount of Rs.2.25 lakhs would be required for preparation of the Atlas. The duration of the Project is 2 years. It is proposed to be taken up during the current year in collaboration with C.E.S.S. under the technical guidance of Prof. Afzal.

The Board may permit the Institute to take up this Project in collaboration with C.E.S.S. in anticipation of the approval of Government.







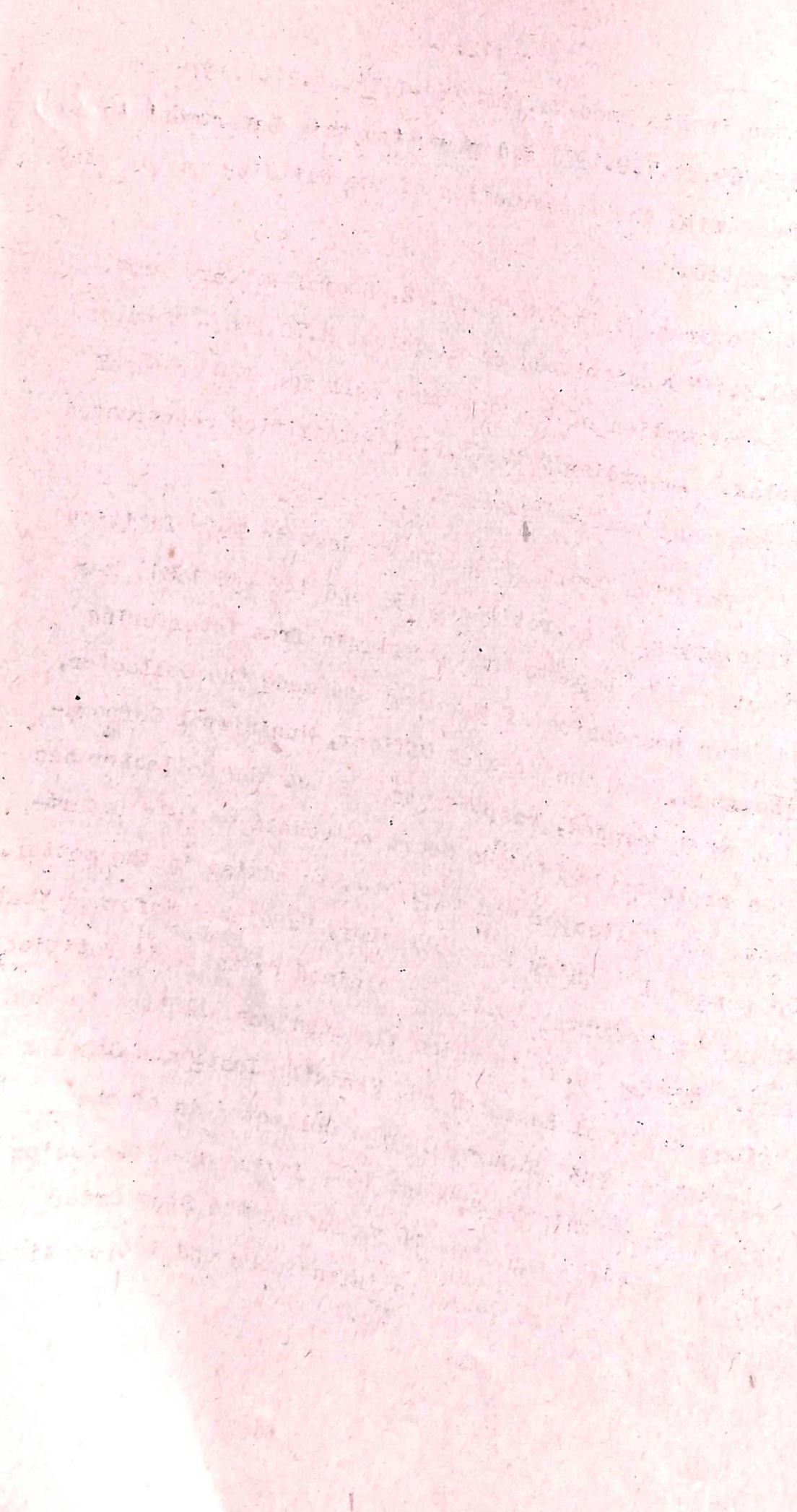
AGENDA ITEM No.8

Construction of Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute Buildings:

Notes:

The District Collector, Hyderabad in his Memo.No. Q2/6691/64-1, dt.24.3.1965 allotted 3 Acres of land in Masab Tank for the construction of Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute Complex. Again on 18-12-1971 the Collector demarcated an approach road in the North and Eastern sides of the site passing through the Dhobi Ghat vide his Proceedings No.F2/18061/71, dt.18.12.1971. As per the instructions of the Government the work was taken up for the construction of the Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute Complex by the P.W.D. authorities. The Government in G.O.Ms.No.729, Revenue (T.W.III) Department dt.29th June, 1972 under Centrally Sponsored Schemes in the year 1972-73 sanctioned an amount of Rs.3.70 lakhs towards construction of the Building for Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute. The Executive Engineer, P.W.D., R & B, Hyderabad, Central Building Division informed that they have spent Rs.1,96,890-57 upto the end of March, 1972. But unfortunately the work was stopped due to the injunction orders issued by the Additional Chief Judge, Hyderabad, in his order No.IA.1163/71. The Collector on behalf of the Department got the stay vacated and





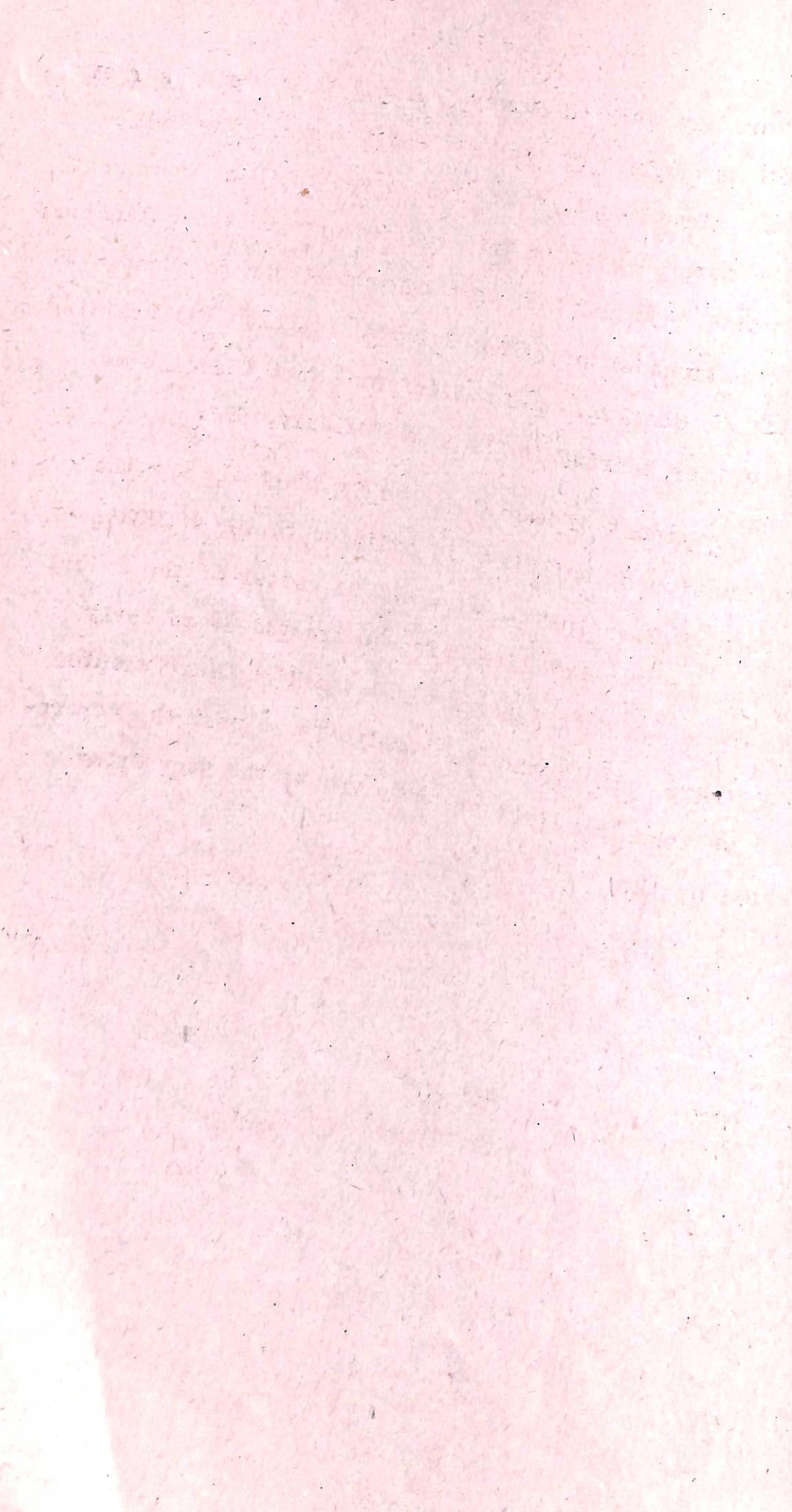


Informed in his Memo No.F2/18061-D/71,dt.21.1.1976 and F2/1535/69,dt.7.9.1976 and requested this Department to go ahead with the construction of the building as the stay was vacated.

Government in G.O.Ms.No.82, Social Welfare Dept. dt.30.3.1979 sanctioned an amount of Rs.70,200/- towards the construction of the compound wall for the proposed complex. Accordingly the P.W.D. authorities constructed the compound wall on request.

The High Court of Andhra Pradesh in Writ Petition (Writs appeal Misc.petitions 138 and 142 and 1981) has directed this Department to restrain from interfering with the possession of the land and made the Collector, Hyderabad, and the Special Officer, Municipal Corporation of Hyderabad, respondents. Since the Collector has been representing in the Court on behalf of this Department, the Collector was requested to advise in the matter. On personal enquiry the Collector, Hyderabad informed that there is no Survey No.128 as claimed by the Writ Petitioners. Survey No.27 in which the land was allotted to the Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute Complex pertains to 1335 F.Survey. The Collector is of the opinion that this Department is enjoying the possession of the land for the last 16 years and the Stay Order issued by the High Court is infructuous and inoperative







as there are only 68 Survey Nos. and there is no survey No.128 as claimed by the Writ Petitioners. The Collector clearly clarified that the land given to this Department is not covered by this Writ Petitioners and the Collector, Hyderabad informed that this Department can go ahead with the construction of Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute Complex. The A.G.informed that the case may come up for hearing in the month of July,1984.

An amount of Rs.18.80 lakhs is available for the construction of buildings in addition to the TRICOR's share of Rs.2.85 lakhs. It would be better if the Tribal Welfare Complex buildings are constructed at an early date in Masab Tank land provided the High Court vacates Stay Order. The Board may resolve to request the Government to take immediate steps to vacate the Stay Order issued by the High Court.







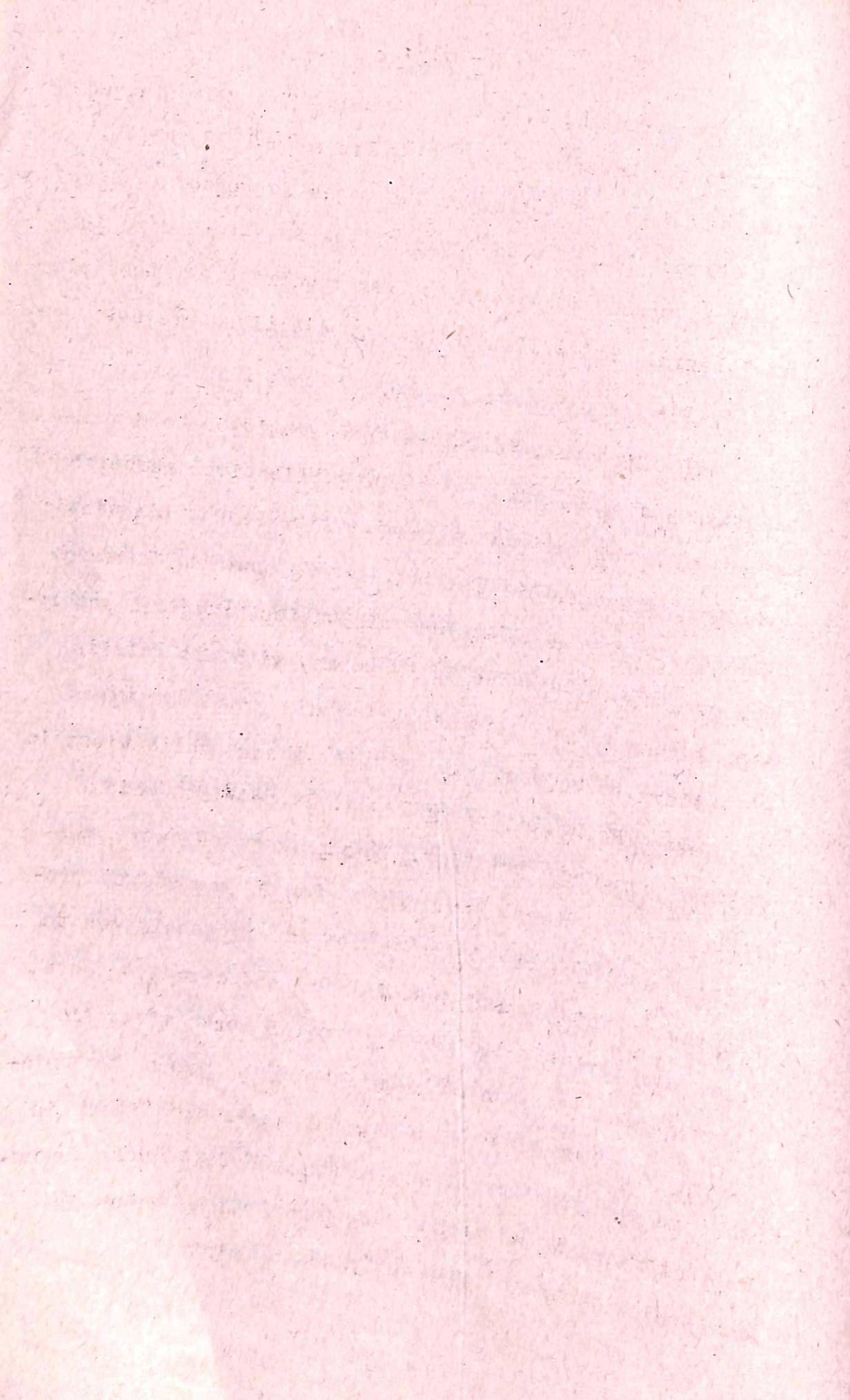
AGENDA ITEM No.9

Printing of Institute's Reports in Cooperative Press or Private presses.

Notes:

Many important studies conducted by the Tribal Research Institute have remained unpublished due to printing difficulties. It is experienced that many of the Research Projects sent to them remained in Government Printing Press for long periods without being printed. As a result that Institute is not able to circulate its publications on a large scale and also not able to meet the demand of the Research bodies, academic Institutions etc. This might perhaps be due to the fact that the Government Printing Press is heavily burdened with certain other priority works. However, some of the publications i.e., Government Orders, Instructions etc. for I.T.D.As, Samanthas, the D.B.K.Railway Project and the Tribes of Araku Valley, Industrialisation of Tribal Areas of Andhra Pradesh, concessions and privileges for promotion of Industries in Scheduled Areas of Andhra Pradesh some editions of the Bulletin and News letters were printed in Government Press, Andhra Pradesh Text Books Press, Cooperative Press and some Private Presses. Still some of the publications are with the Government Printing Press since four to five years. The Sub Plan of Tribal Areas







in Andhra Pradesh, I.T.D.A., Visakhapatnam were handed over to the Government Printing Press in 1979 and till now they have not intimated the pages for proof reading and correction. The Officers of the Institute were in constant touch with the press for rendering any possible assistance. But till now these publications are not delivered.

The Director, Tribal Welfare submitted to Government in Social Welfare a list of publications numbering about 40 under various categories like Plans, Linguistic studies, Ethnographic Studies, Development and Research Studies, Survey and Statistical Studies, Physical Anthropology studies, and Publicity works, with all details like number of pages, copies, the sizes and the types of letters to be used for printing these publications in his letter No.2817/79/TRI/Pub., dt.9-4-1980 which require immediate printing. These proposals were submitted to Government keeping in view of the budget provisions and the very intention of the proposals was to get the printing works done in time and circulate them. There are certain specialized type of works viz., the Linguistic studies which require special types for printing. These special types are not available either in Government Press or the Andhra Pradesh Text Books Press. In fact there is no press in Andhra Pradesh which is equipped with these special types to print the

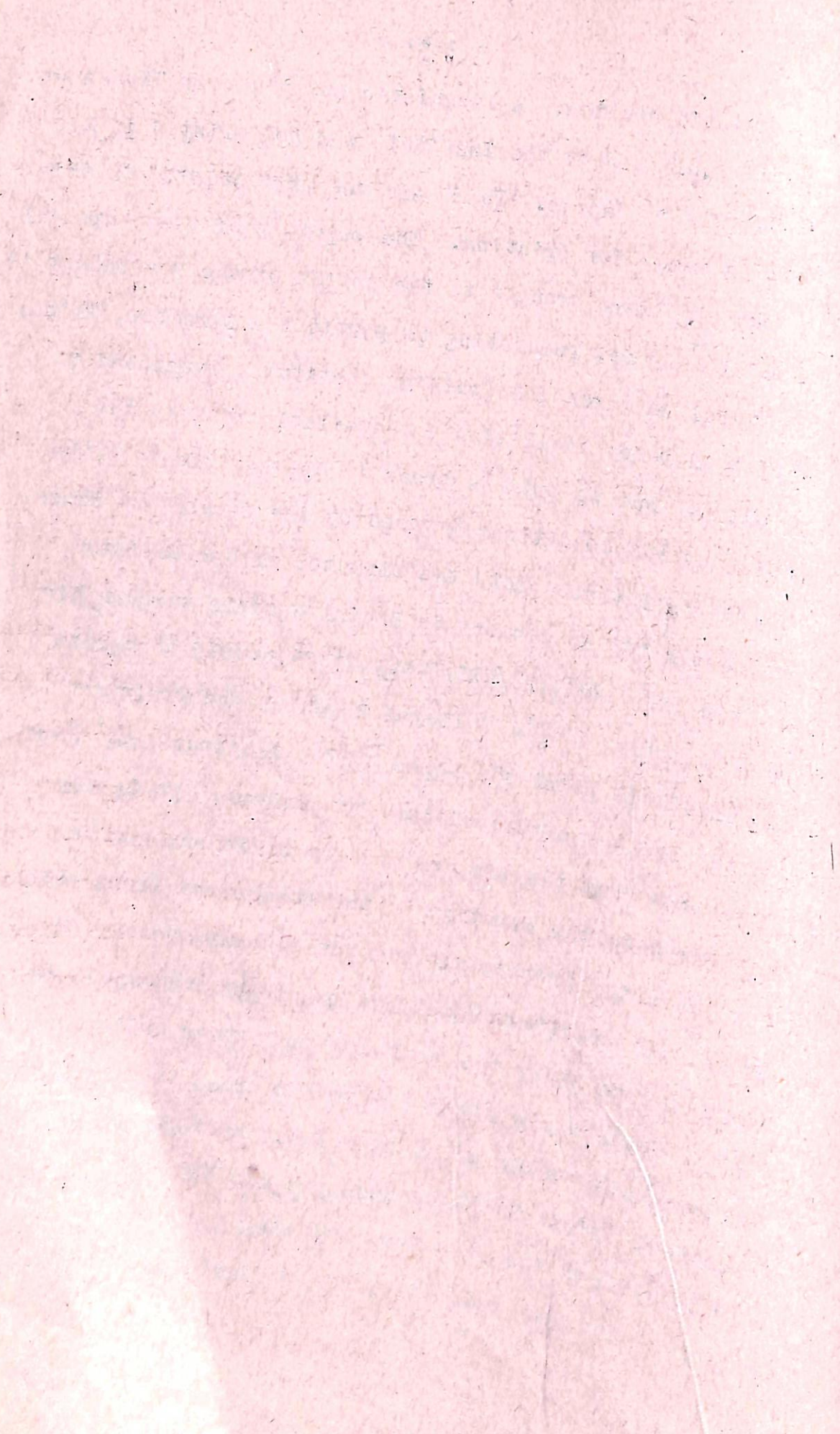






Linguistic studies. A linguistic study namely "Konda or Kubi" published by the Institute was got printed in M/s G.S. Press in Madras. There are two more studies in this series ready for printing. The printing of these special works also were brought to the notice of the Government in Social Welfare, requesting to permit the Director, Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad to print wherever facilities are available with in the country. But no private press is coming forward to be abide by the conditions imposed by the Government Press. Stating all these facts the Director Tribal Welfare requested the Government in Social Welfare through his letter Rc. No. 2871/79/TRI/Pub..., dt. 25.6.1979 to permit the Director, Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute to print the works of the Institute any where in the country after calling for tenders. It is also requested that the tenders and the bills may not be subjected to the scrutiny of the Government Press which condition the Private presses are not accepting. The Director, Government Printing Press has expressed his inability to print the publications either ordinary works or linguistic works stating that the press is heavily burdened with other priority works. In this regard, the Director, Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute personally met the Director, Printing and Stationary and had discussions. Each time, it was decided to print the



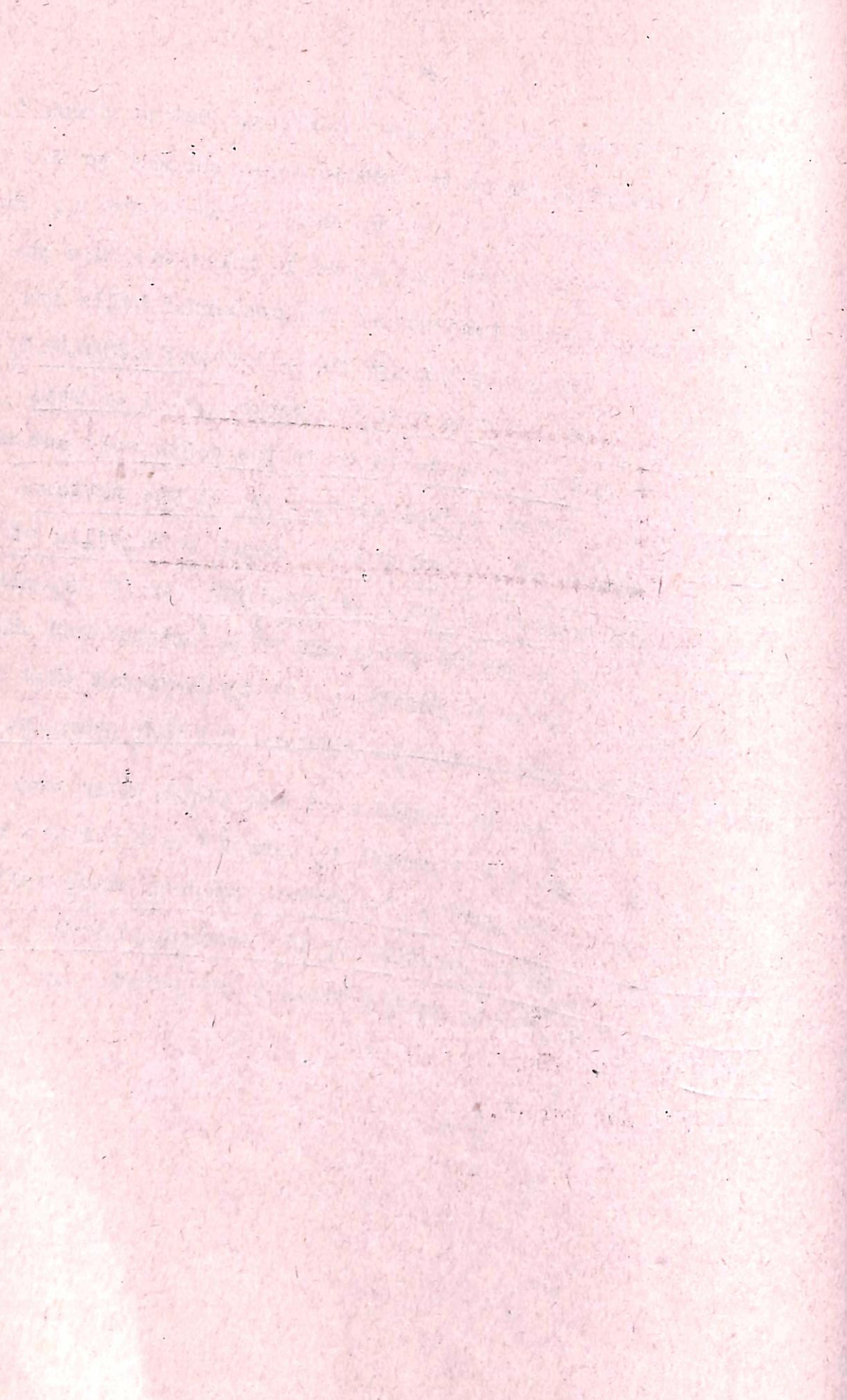




works furnished by the Government Press. But no press is coming forward to print the publications subject to the rules and conditions imposed by the Government Press. But the Government Press did not agree to relax the rule regarding scrutiny of tenders and the concerned bills and finally sent its reply through their letter No.2398/H.1/80, dt.19.2.1981 stating that the works may be printed in private presses situated with in the state only and will assist the Director, Tribal Welfare in all the matters in finalisation of tenders and the scrutiny of bills of the private presses as and when required. As it is, all together about 40 publications are to be printed and other roneo works need title printing. It is estimated that an amount of Rs.5 lakhs would be required for this purpose.

In view of the position stated above, Board may resolve to request Government to permit the Institute to get the documents printed in private presses after calling for tenders without scrutiny of the Government Printing Press. The institute publications to be printed are give in Annexure-V.





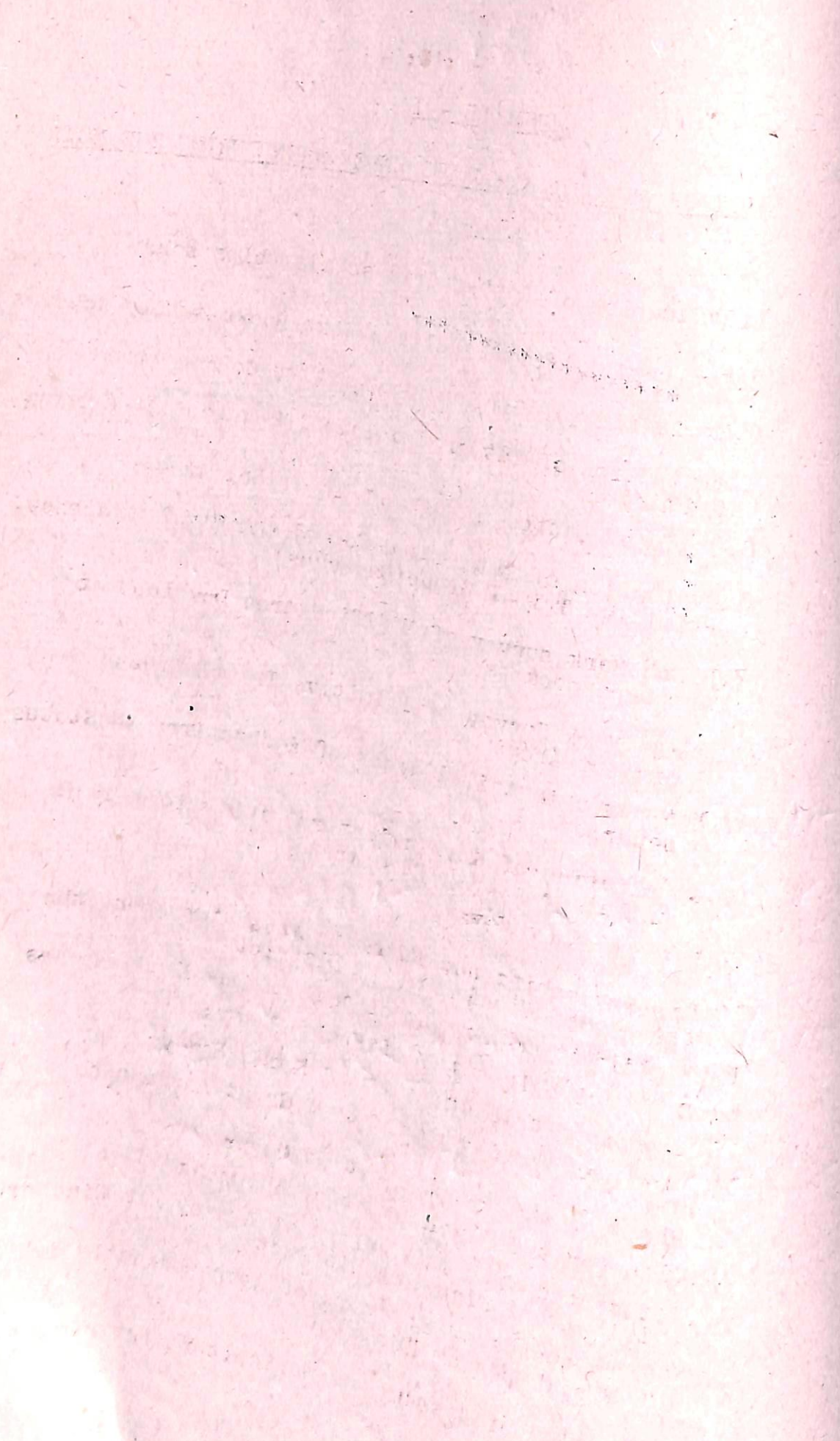

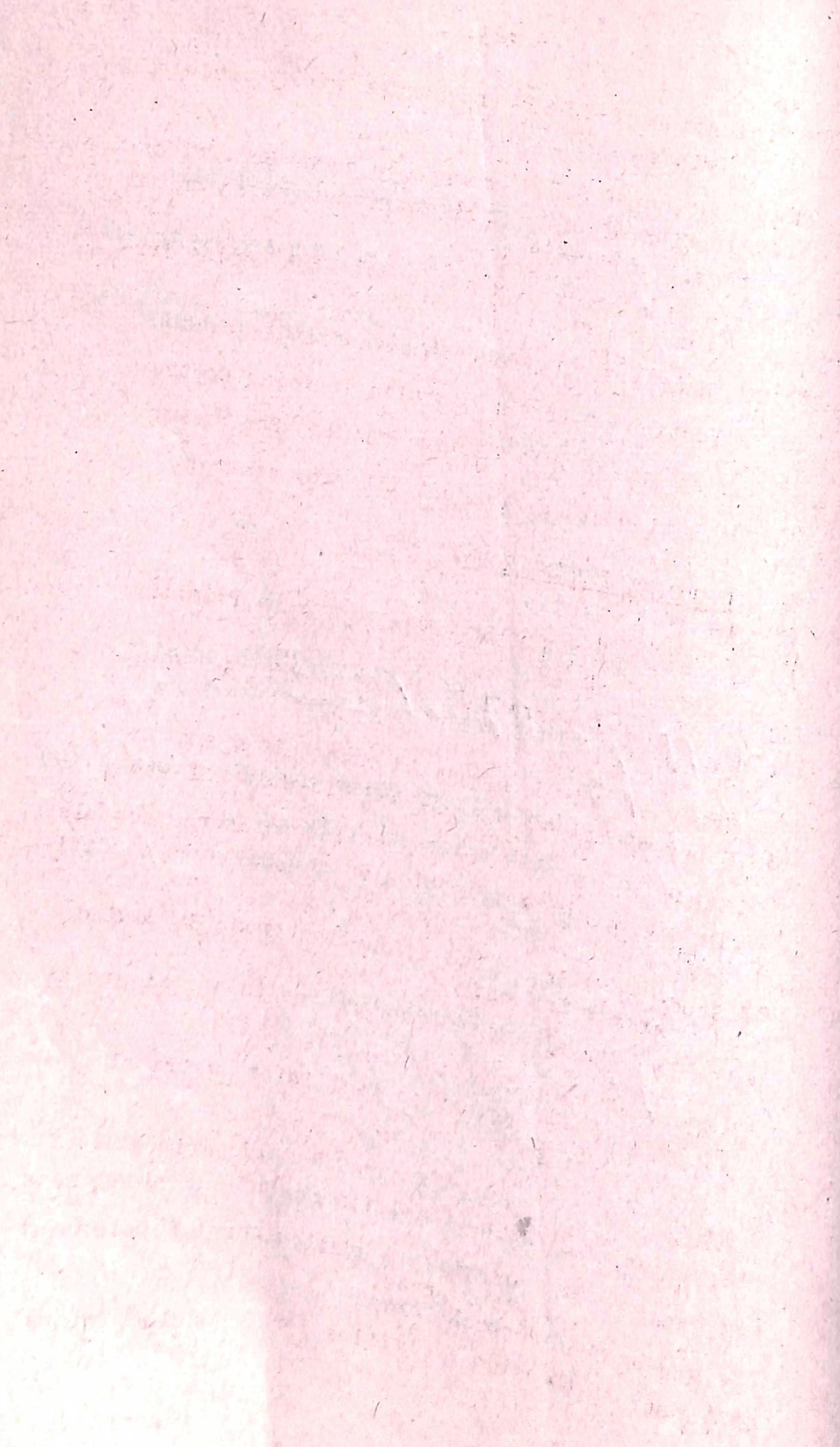

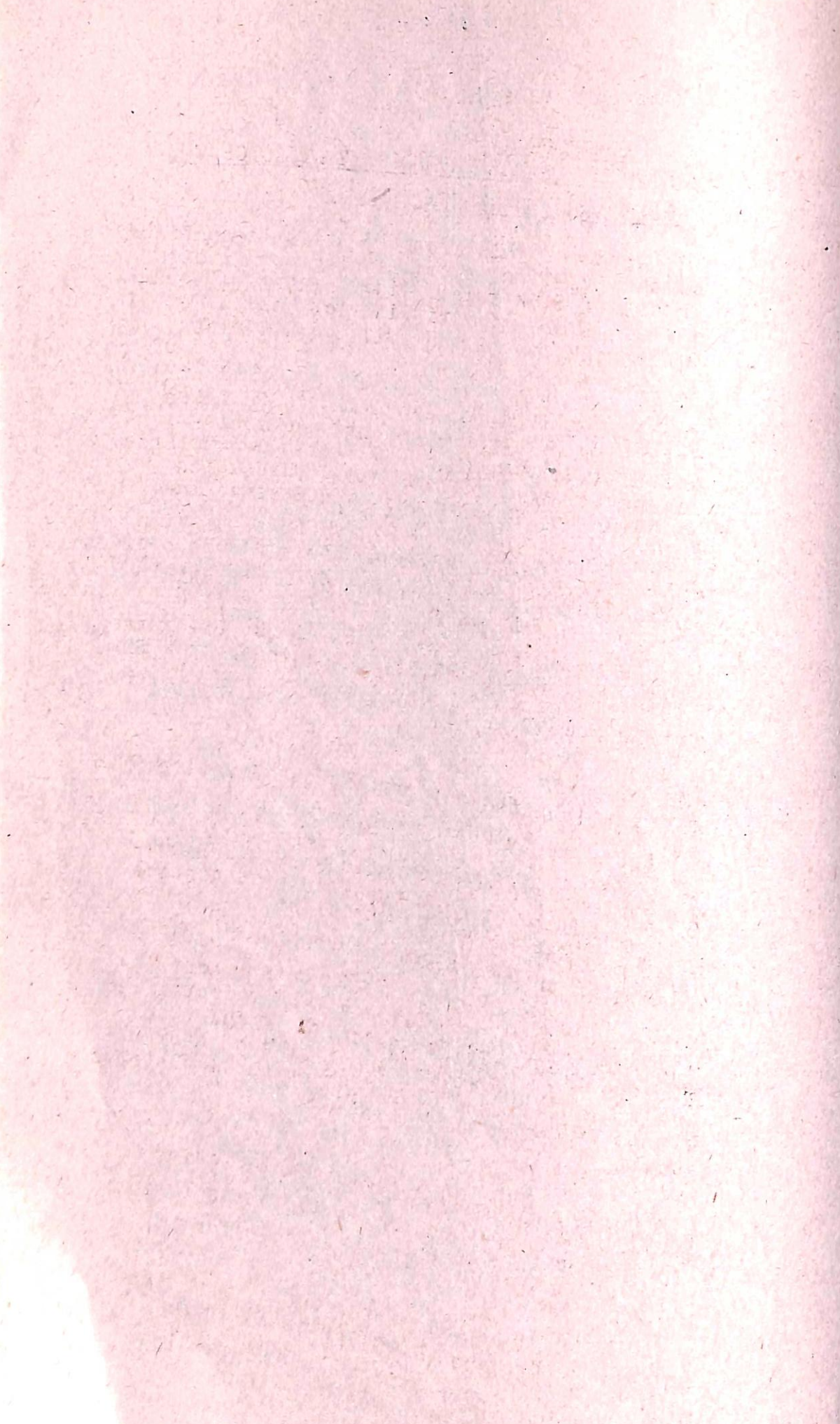

ANNEXURE IV  
DESIGN FOR PROPOSED TRIBAL DEVELOPMENT ATLAS OF SUB  
PLAN AREA IN ANDHRA PRADESH

**I.SCOPE:** The Scope of this proposed Atlas is confined to the Sub-Plan areas (Tribal concentration areas) of Srikakulam, Vijayanagara, Visakhapatnam, East Godavari District West Godavari Khammam, Warangal and Adilabad Districts.

**II. AIM:** The aim of the proposed Atlas is to focus attention on Techno-economic and socio-cultural development of Sub-plan Areas through schematic and Thematic maps. This Atlas contains qualitative and quantitative information on tribal areas, their population characteristics, development programmes besides indicating the potentialities in different sectors. This Atlas would ultimately serve as a bench mark study to Academicians, Planners Policy makers and to all those interested in Tribal Welfare.

**III.OBJECTIVES:**

1. To highlight the topographic and Physiographic features of Sub-plan area.
2. To portray through thematic maps the Demographic, Social and Cultural characteristics of Tribal Areas and Communities.
3. To depict the spatial distribution of rural electrification programme in tribal areas and the cluster of villages to be electrified for rapid economic development of sub-plan areas, particularly in the fields of Agriculture, Irrigation, Ground water and Industries etc.
4. To highlight the economic characteristics and integrated resource development strategies adopted for the tribal areas in different sectors.

The Atlas for Sub-plan area would be divided broadly into five sections which are as follows:

Section-I Physical: Topographic and Physiographic features of the area

Section-II Socio-economic and Cultural characteristics of the area







- Section-II Demographic: Demographic and social Characteristics of tribal communities
- Section-III Economic: Economic and Development Characteristics
- Section-IV Electrification: Power Development in the sub-plan area
- Section-V Cultural: Cultural Characteristics

The details of thematic maps under each section can be worked out by a technical sub-committee while they look into the data available and the importance and requirements of individual themes.

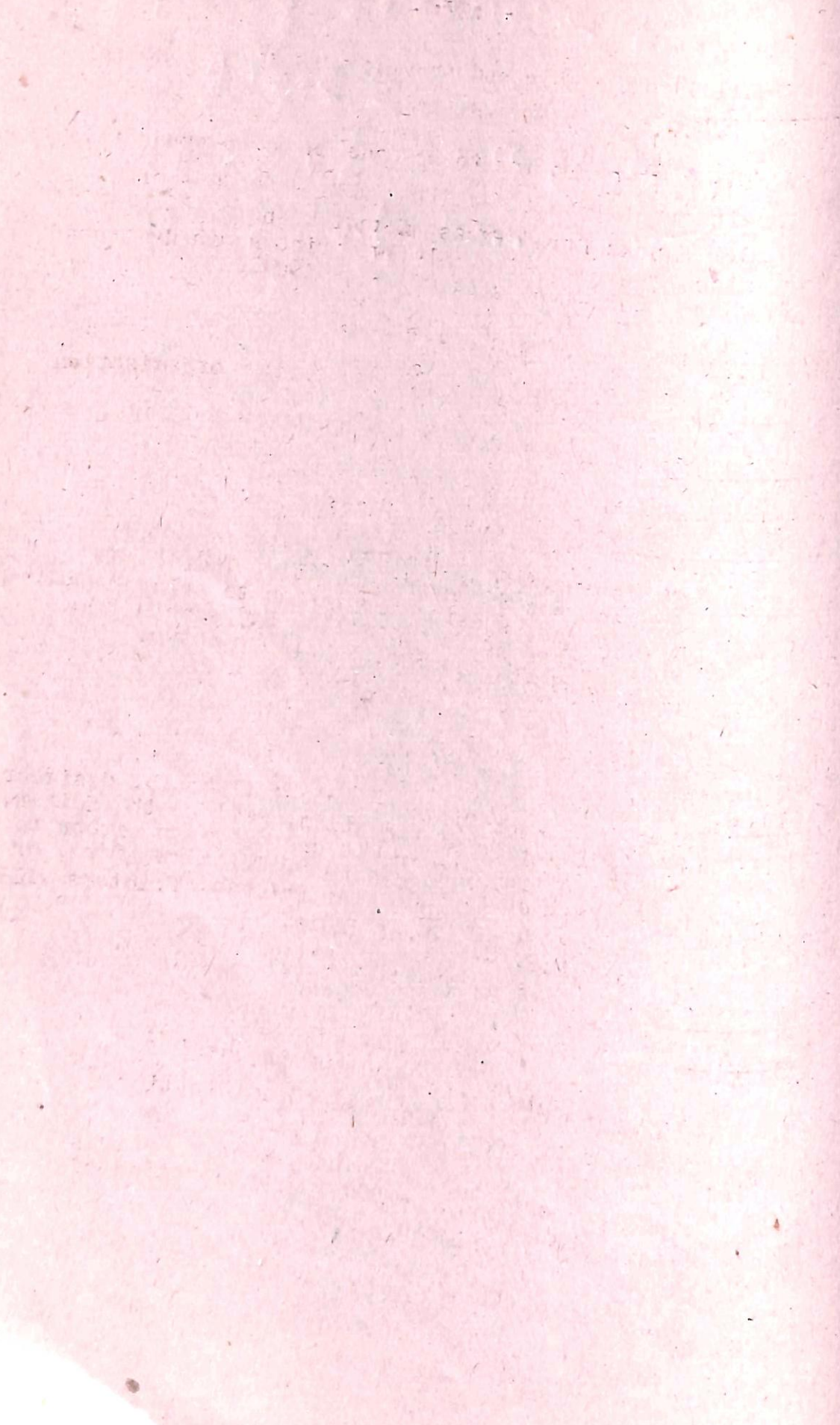
