## P R E F A C E

This is the fifth Administration Report of Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad since its inception in 1963. The present report covers the period from April 1, 1969 to March 31, 1970.

The objectives of the Institute are to conduct empirical studies on various facets of life and culture of tribes of Andhra Pradesh and to survey the socio-economic problems and felt needs, to evaluate the performance of various Tribal development programmes and assess the impact of various programmes <sup>/on</sup> the tribals and suggest various remedial measures to rectify the pit-falls. Training is also imparted to the Officials and non-officials engaged in Tribal Welfare so as to enable them to gain an insight into the Tribal life and problems. Much leeway has been registered in these directions during the period under review.

A new dimension has been added to the research programmes of the Institute with preparation of a comprehensive Master plan entitled "Special Programme for the Development of Scheduled Areas and Scheduled Tribes

of Andhra Pradesh in Fourth Five Year Plan".

Further the Institute has participated in the global Centenary celebrations of Gandhiji in a befitting manner. A series of Lectures on Gandhiji's thought by eminent persons has been instituted and booklets enshrining the important views and utterances of the Father of Nation on the 'salt of the soil' and their Welfare in Telugu and English are brought out.

A vigorous publicity programme has also been initiated in the tribal areas by pressing into service three publicity units in three important centres. A publicity booklet in Telugu entitled 'Adivasula Kai Trabhu-tva Krushi' about the various Tribal development programmes was also published.

This report besides presenting the achievements made during the year indicates the avenues of future Research and Training of the Institute.

## CHAPTER-I

### R E S E A R C H

The Institute has been organising various Research projects on the tribal problems of the State. The introduction of Development programmes and the adoption of democratic decentralisation as an instrumentality of development in the tribal areas have set in motion various forces of change in the traditional socio-politico-economic and cultural spheres of tribal life. The emerging situation calls for investigations so as to gauge the impact of these institutions on the various spheres of tribal life. This in turn necessitated the Institute to shift its emphasis from Basic Research to Applied Research projects. The period under review (1969-70) had an intense activity under Research Programmes and significant progress has been registered by the Research Wing. The studies conducted cover problems relating to Education, Agriculture and Leadership. The findings of the various projects have been helpful in understanding the situation and the process of change in the spheres of Education, Agriculture, Leadership etc. in tribal areas of the State.



The period under review happened to be Gandhi Centenary year. The Institute paid its homage to the Father of Nation on the centenary year by instituting lectures by eminent persons on 'Gandhiji and his thought' and publishing a booklet entitled 'Gandhiji on Tribes and Tribal Wel-fare' in Telugu and English Languages. Another important feature of the year is the preparation of a special programme for the development of Scheduled Areas and Scheduled Tribes of Andhra Pradesh in Fourth Five Year Plan. Further a few appraisal letters were sent to the Director, Tribal Welfare highlighting certain problems in the field of development.

Every Research Project of the Institute undergoes different stages such as preparation of Research Design, field work, processing and analysis of data and preparation of Research Report. The various stages of each Research project completed by the institute during the year 1969-70 are mentioned hereunder.

APPRAISAL  
LETTERS:

The main aim of sending Appraisal letters on tribal affairs is to pin-point certain field problems and bring to the notice of the Director, Tribal Welfare the prevailing development situation. These Appraisal letters are drafted on the basis of empirical data and field knowledge. During the year 1969-70 the following Appraisal letters were sent to the Director, Tribal Welfare.

- (1) Guide lines for Officials and others to identify tribal candidates for issuing community certificates:

This letter was prepared for appraising the officials as to what factors should be taken into consideration in issuing a community certificate to tribals.

- (2) Wastage and Stagnation in the Elementary Schools of Tribal areas in Andhra Pradesh:

The factors which are responsible for the prevalence of Wastage and Stagnation in elementary schools of Tribal areas were dealt with and the measures for reducing the incidence of wastage and stagnation were suggested.

- (3) Need to shift emphasis from demonstration to schemes of Economic development:

This letter indicated the need to focus the limited resources on selected projects which are aimed at economic development while taking into consideration



the relatively shorter duration of the C.D.Pro-grammes in some areas, lack of concentration of the pro-gramme in tribal pockets and geographical distribution of population.

(4) Need to enhance the Central assistance to T.D.Blocks in Stage I, II and III during IV Plan:

This letter dr-aws the attention of Go-vernment to the necessity for providing enhanced financial assistance to T.D.Blocks which are in different stages of development during Fourth Five Year Plan.

The main features of the publications are given below

I. D.B.K.Railway Project and the Tribals of Araku Valley:

The Main object of this empirical study was to investigate in to the effects of D.B.K.Railway Project on the various facets of life and culture of tribes of Araku Valley. The study revealed that the construction work of the D.B.K.Rail-way Project provided the tribals an opportunity to escape the shackles of 'Gothi' or bonded labour system as they could find an alternative livelihood. The construction work could also wean away many of the tribals from shifting cultivation, thus showing that given a better opportunity, the tribals are prepared to accept new livelihood patterns.

Though the construction activity provided temporary economic relief to the tribals, its social consequences are to some extent not encouraging as it slightly upset the existing social systems resulting in cases of violation of tribe endogamy, disorganisation of family life, increased addiction to illicit liquor and gambling and the appearance of even prostitution in the wake of large scale immigration of workers from various parts of the country.

The study stresses the need for drawing up of a suitable development programme for preparing the tribals to reap the benefits of the prospective development of industrial and communication sectors and provides the necessary guidelines for evolving such a programme.

## 2. Shifting Cultivation in Andhra Pradesh:

This Research paper throws light on the magnitude of the problem of shifting cultivation, and the remedial measures to be taken to wean away the tribals from shifting cultivation. In this empirical study certain measures were also recommended both for rehabilitating 'Podu' cultivators, wherever feasible on settled cultivation and for improving the present 'Podu' practices on scientific lines if sufficient land is not available for settling 'Podu' cultivators.

## 3. Konda or Kubi - A Dravidian Language by Bh. Krishnamurti.

This is a pioneering but systematic and scholarly treatise on Konda or Kubi, language of Konda Doras living in the Scheduled areas of Visakhapatnam Dist. of Andhra Pradesh and the neighbouring Koraput District of Orissa State. This book consists of three parts. The Part-I contains a number of Texts with English translation followed by Part-II which contains an elaborate account of Phonology, Morphophonemics, classification of words,



parts of speech, clitics and syntax of the language. The Part-III contains vocabulary of the language. This study marshalls evidence to prove that Konda provides an important link between Kui-Kuvi, the language of neighbouring Khonds on the one hand and Pengo Manda on the other.

4. Survey of T.D.Block - Bhadragiri, Srikakulam District:

This is a third report in the series of T.D. Block surveys. This is a bench-mark survey which throws light on the geographical distribution of Scheduled tribes, oc-cupational structure, incidence of indebtedness, education and health facilities. This survey report reveals that workers constitute 65.07% to the total sample population. The Agricultural sector constitutes the main field of economic activity of the tribals of this Block as 83.2% of tribal workers are engaged in it. Land under irrigation constitutes only 20.04% to the total net area sown. 57.5% of the tribals constitute landless people. This study further indicates that 74.59% have borrowed loans from private money lenders. This s-urvey also revealed that 55% of the main villages and 80.2% of the hamlets in this Block are still in need of drinking water wells.

5. Tribal Welfare (Facts and Figures):

This book was initiated with a view to enlighten the officials, non-officials and others interested in the field of tribal welfare about the various development programmes implemented for the up-lift of Scheduled Tribes by way of providing statistical information. This book throws light on the physical achievements made in the various facets of tribal welfare programmes during Ist, IInd and IIIrd Five Year Plans besides the targets achieved in the two annual plans ending with 1967-68. Further programme-wise achievements and the regional distribution of these programmes were also furnished for the use of research workers, administrators, social workers and others.

6. Gandhiji on Tribes and Tribal Welfare:

This Brochure was brought out by the Institute to coincide with the Gandhi Centenary celebrations. The Brochure throws light on Gandhiji's selected writings and utterances on Tribes and Tribal Welfare. Gandhiji regarded social reconstruction based on equal opportunities for all sections of the society as a necessary adjunct of the national movement aimed at achieving Swaraj. According to Gandhiji the tribals are amenable to reason and God fearing too. He said 'All they need is the spinning



wheel in their homes and schools in which their children can receive simple education". He prescribed craft-based education as the most suitable type of education for them. This brief review of Gandhiji's thought and suggestions reveal that Gandhiji could devote his precious time to numerous problems confronting the tribals.

7. "Adivasulakai Prabhutva Krushi":

This pamphlet was published by the Institute in Telugu throwing light on the strenuous efforts made by the Department for the development of Scheduled Tribes in Andhra Pradesh. The achievements were furnished in different fields of developmental activities especially Agriculture, Irrigation, Animal Husbandry, Industries, Co-operation, Education and Medical and Public Health. This is a publicity pamphlet which was widely circulated among the tribals of the State.

8. Special programme for the Development of Scheduled Areas and Scheduled Tribes of Andhra Pradesh in IV Five Year Plan:

This plan document was prepared by the Institute and presented to the Official Team, Government of India during their visit to the State in February 1970. This plan envisages an outlay of Rs.53.20 crores for the development of Scheduled areas and Scheduled Tribes in

different fields such as Agriculture, Minor Irrigation , Animal Husbandry, Communications, Medical and Public Health Forests etc. The unique feature of this document is the provision of funds for tribal protection, electrification, -- debt relief and rural credit. Further this special plan aims at reducing the regional and inter-tribal socio-economic imbalances within the tribal areas on the one hand and between the tribals and non-tribals on the other, while paying special attention to tribal pockets.

The Plan document entitled Special Programme for the development of Scheduled Areas and Scheduled Tribes of Andhra Pradesh in Fourth Five Year Plan was well received in official circles of both State and Central Governments.



T R A I N I N G

The broad objective of the training programme is to equip the participants with deeper understanding of strategy of Tribal Welfare administration and to provide them with a sound knowledge of the various tribal cultures so as to enable the trainees in involving actively in the implementation of development programmes.

PROGRAMMES:

The various types of training programmes conducted by this Institute are as follows:

I. Training Programme in Tribal Welfare and its Administration:

a) Category I:- Officers consisting of District Officers and Extension staff of all the development departments.

b) Category II:- Officers comprising of Village Level Workers, Gram Sevikas, Women Welfare Organisers etc.

II. Short-term Orientation Course for:-

a) Junior I.A.S. Officers.

b) Probationary Deputy Collectors.

### III. Peripatetic Training Programme for Tribal Leaders:

The training courses for the Officers of Category I and II were organised from 1963 to 1966. The Regular Training Programme was kept in abeyance from 1967 onwards. Government in Panchayat Raj Department agreed in principle to depute all the extension staff to this Institute for training. But the Government orders were not received during the period under review.

Training Programmes are arranged to Junior I.A.S. Officers for providing orientation courses in Tribal Welfare with special emphasis on Tribal Development Programmes and operation of protective legislation in tribal areas.

During the year under review peripatetic training programmes were organized for Tribal leaders to enlighten them regarding the constitutional safeguards, protective legislations, concessions and privileges extended by both State and Central Governments, and other development programmes undertaken by the Government for Tribal Welfare.

EDUCATIONAL  
TOURS:

The Junior I.A.S. Officers who underwent training in this Institute were taken to Tribal Darbar, Keslapur to acquaint them with the problems of tribals and gave them an opportunity to study the felt needs <sup>/of</sup> the tribals and their attitude to development Programmes. The list of participants is given in Annexure No.2.

As a part of the training programme, educational tour was also arranged for the participants of peripatetic training programme. They were taken to Nagarjunasagar, Caltex Oil Refinery, Vizag Dairy Farm, Poultry Farm, Harbour at Visakhapatnam, development centres in the neighbouring districts to enlighten them with the progress achieved by the Country in different fields of development. The list of participants in the peripatetic training programmes is furnished in Annexure No.3.

During the year 1970-71, it is proposed to conduct training programmes for Standing Committee members of tribal panchayat Samithis and Tribal M.L.As, M.Ps etc.



### CHAPTER-III

#### R E P O S I T O R I E S

The Information Cell of this Institute is intended to educate the public regarding the life and culture of tribal people with its constituents viz., Library Museum, Data Bank and Photographic Section etc. which are mainly useful in providing full information regarding the development of the Scheduled Tribes and Scheduled Areas and the changing Panorama of Tribal Life and culture in the context of development going around them.

#### LIBRARY:

Library of this Institute has been organised on D.D.classification. The Library is exclusively meant for Research workers and Trainees. During the period under review 515 new books have been added to the Library raising the total number of books on the shelves of the Library to 3,061. The books were classified subject-wise and catalogues were prepared. The Library contains books on Social Sciences especially Sociology, Anthropology, Economics, Social Work, Statistics, Research Methodology etc. During the period under review 101 books were received as gift from different sources such as Registrar General of Census, Commissioner for Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes and Ministry of Home Affairs of Government of India,

Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Planning and Panchayat Raj Department of Government of Andhra Pradesh and other sister institutions. MUSEUM:

The Museum of the Institute is intended to educate visitors about the various aspects of tribal life and culture. Some of the impor-tant



additions to the Museum during the period under review are paintings on Hunting techniques of tribals, plaster replicas of tribal house types, Tribal Art panel, Dimsa Dance Diorama et c. The list of sculpture pieces, paintings, Maps etc., prepared by the Artist and Sculptor is furnished in Annexure No.5.

BANK:- ...

The Institute has been maintaining Data Bank to preserve both qualitative and quantitative data in the field of tribal Welfare. The Data Bank is intended to help the Planners and Research workers by providing them the necessary data in formulating schemes on Tribes and Tribal Welfare. Most of the data for the Data Bank were collected through mailed questionnaires. During the period under review efforts were made to make the available data upto date and to post additional data on Tribal development programmes.

The data bank comprises of 'Visadex' and 'Kardex'. The Visadex contains descriptive notes on various tribal groups and other research material while statistical data are preserved by posting the data on cards, which are arranged subject-wise in Kardex. Some of the important topics on which the data are maintained are given in the Annexure No.6.

The Data from the Bank are utilised in bring-ing out statistical publications like "Hand Boo k of Statistics" "Tribal Welfare-Facts and Figures", "Guide to T.D.Blocks" etc. It is also utilised in ploughing back the research results to Planners, Administrators and Policy makers.

PHOTOGRAPHIC

The photographic section of the Museum includes photos depicting the physical features, Social and Cul-tural life of the Tribes and various development programmes in the fields of Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, Irrigation, Education, Health etc.

EXHIBITION

During the year under review, the Tribal Welfare Department participated in the All India Industrial Exhi-biti-on. The exhibi-ts in the stall were arranged in a more attractive and sys-tematic way to give a clear cut idea of traditional life and culture of the tribes of Andhra Pradesh on one hand and the various programmes launched by the Department for rapid development of the tribes on the other.

While the various facets of tribal life and cul-ture were depicted throughx dioramas, wall panels, statues and colour paintings, photographs were displayed in the stall so as to facilitate the visitors to know various



tribal development programmes launched by the Tribal Welfare Department. The physical achievements in the various fields of development are attractively displayed through various charts, pie diagrams and pictographs. The stall attracted the public in large numbers.



G U I D A N C E

Guidance is given by the Institute to University students, Research scholars, Foreigners as well as Indian, Administrators and Tourists who visit the Institute for drawing upon the resources of the Institute. The guidance is provided on tribal life, Culture, languages and economy, socio-economic problems of tribes of Andhra Pradesh and Tribal Welfare Programmes, literature and selection of areas of research and field work.

OPINIONS

A few opinions and views expressed by the visitors about the Institute are furnished hereunder:

Sri L.M. Shrikant, Chairman of the Study Team on Tribal research Institutes visited this Institute on 17-1-70. He expressed that "It was a pleasure to visit the Tribal Research Institute which has developed since 1963. We were shown round the Museum and other departments and glad to learn a good deal of useful work and study put in the Institution. We wish the best for the Institute".

On 2-1-70 Dr. Hugh Gray M.P., Hon. Lecturer, School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, visited this Institute and expressed: "An extremely well compiled and exhibited collection of ethnographic materials from the tribal areas of Andhra Pradesh".



On 4-3-70 Dr. H. Hartmann, Institute for Development Research and Development policy, Ruhr University Bochum, visited and observed all the activities which are going on in this Institute with a keen interest. He remarked that " I am fescinated by the work which is being continuously done here and very thankful for the really helpful advises and material furnished".

Sri Durga Das . Editor-in-Chief of India News, Jeevan Deep, Parliament street, New Delhi, visited the Institute and remarked that " I am happy to visit this Institute and learn of the work it is doing for making the tribal problem properly understood and for finding the right solution to it. The tribals are nearer nature than others and they can enrich the life of the Nation by joining its main stream. I wish the Institute every success under its active and enthusiastic Director and his staff".

On 15-10-1969 Sri Kodati Narayana Rao, Secretary, Andhra Pradesh Gandhi Smaraka Nidhi, Hyderabad visited and expressed his views: "I had the occasion of visiting the Institute today (15-10-1969) in connection with Candhi Centenary. I learned many things from the exhibits in the Museum. There is a good collection of books in the library. I wish that the results of the research should be made available to the public".



Sri Devendra Singh Saktamat, Principal of Tribal Orientation and Study Centre, Udaipur (Rajasthan) visited this Institute on 17-10-1969 and stated as follows "It was a most exciting experience to know and learn about tribals of Andhra Pradesh. Lot of good material is ready which profitably could be utilised by Trainers and Administrators. More liaison should be there between Research and Training".

Sri A.R. Sharma (Government of Rajasthan) Sri S.Premkumar (Hyderabad) and Sri M.L. Wat (Government of Jammu and Kashmir) visited this Institute on 11-8-69 and expressed their views: "We the trainee officers of the Small Industries Extension Training Institute, Hyderabad, had the pleasure to meet the Director, Tribal Welfare and Research Institute. We were enriched in our knowledge about the tribals, their traditions and problems during the discussions with the Director. The Museum is also highly instructive".

A Team of four Royal Air Force Officers visited this Institute to acquaint themselves with the Chenchus life and culture and other tribes of Andhra Pradesh.

During the period under review the Institute participated in the Folk Arts Festival conducted by Andhra Pradesh Sangeeta Nataka Akademi Tribal Dance Troupes were brought from Utnoor Adilabad Dist., Chintapalli Block of and Laxettipet Blocks of Visakhapatnam District and from the Suburbs of Hyderabad city. Mathura Dance, Dappulu dance,



Banjara dance and Dimsa dance were arranged by the Institute during the Folk Arts Festival. These dances were among the star attractions of the Festival.

CONFERENCES,

SEMINARS

AND TALKS:

Sri D.R. Pratap, Principal of the Institute conducted group discussions for trainee I.A.S. Officers on various aspects of Tribal Development in Andhra Pradesh. A seminar on the "Welfare of Scheduled Tribes" was also conducted on 4-2-'70 as a part of training programme to the Junior I.A.S. Officers wherein the Chief guest was Sri Hassan Askari, Department of Sociology, Osmania University.

The staff of this Institute also participated in the Seminar.

The Principal participated in the discussions held by official Team, Government of India who visited the State in February '70. He also attended conferences which were held at Delhi during the period under review. He participated in the Seminar on "Developmental aspects of the tribals in India" sponsored by the Indian committee for Cultural Freedom and Indian Anthropological Association, New Delhi. A paper on the Tribal situation in Andhra Pradesh was contributed by the Principal to the All India Seminar on Tribal Situation in India with special reference to Boarder Tribes - sponsored by the Indian Institute of Advanced Study, Rashtrapati Nivas,

Simla-5 - Himachal Pradesh.

Another paper on Tribal Dances of Andhra Pradesh was Published in the Natya Kala Special Issue brought out by the Sangeeta Nataka Akademi, Andhra Pradesh.

Since the priod under review happened to be Gandhi Centenary year, the Institute arranged talks by eminent persons on Gandhiji's views on Tribes and Tribal Welfare.

## CHAPTER - V

### ADMINISTRATION

#### BUDGET:

The Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad, was started under Centrally Sponsored Schemes on 8th April 1963. During the year 1967-68 the financial provision of this Institute was strengthened due to the provision of additional funds from the Government of India for the promotion of Research and Training in the field of Tribal Welfare. At the end of the financial year 1968-69, the funds provided by the Government of India came under committed expenditure of the State Government. Central Government continued to give assistance under Centrally Sponsored Schemes during the year 1969-70 for further promotion of Research and Training in the field of Tribal Welfare. The budget position of the Institute during the year 1969-70 is as follows.

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A scheme for promotion of research was submitted to Government in Rc. No.2344/69-TRI-A1, dated 15-8-1969. But Government at a later date advised to submit a modified scheme for publicity.

According<sup>ly</sup>/a scheme for undertaking an intensive publicity campaign in the scheduled areas of the State under Centrally Sponsored Schemes was submitted to Government in this office letter No.2344/69-TRI-A1, dated 23-3-'70. The Government in their order No.331 Rev. TW/I, dated 24-3-70 have sanctioned the establishment of three publicity centres at Bhadrachalam Tribal Development Block in Srikakulam District, Bhadrachalam in Khammam District and Asifabad in Adilabad District with necessary publicity equipment.

The first meeting of the Reconstituted Advisory Board was held on 20-3-70. The main feature of this meeting is that the Advisory Board members resolved to offer Research fellowships during the year 1970-71 for further promotion of research on Tribal Culture and Development and to start new training programmes for the Standing Committee Members of tribal Panchayat Samithis and to Tribal M.L.As, M.Ps etc. The Minutes of the meeting are given in Annexure No.10.

CHAPTER-VI

FUTURE PROGRAMME OF RESEARCH AND TRAINING

Applied Research and Evaluation studies are assuming increasing importance in the wake of changing horizons of the tribal areas consequent upon the introduction of various development programmes in the tribal areas of Andhra Pradesh. The Research findings of the Institute have been fruitfully utilised by Department of Tribal Welfare and other Departments to remove the administrative bottlenecks and to surmount socio-cultural barriers and to gear up the implementation of various programmes for Socio-Economic development of tribals of Andhra Pradesh.

The peripatetic training programme during the previous years yielded encouraging results and succeeded in achieving the avowed objective. The Institute has therefore decided to continue the peripatetic programme for tribal leaders.

CUR-

RESEARCH

The introduction of massive development programmes in tribal areas have set in motion a series of changes in the socio-culture-politico-economic spheres of the tribals. The emergent situation calls for a shift in the emphasis of the research programmes of the Institute.



Further, there are various vistas of research which have been so far left untouched for various reasons but need immediate investigation. The Denotified Tribes, Nomadic Tribes and Semi-nomadic Tribes constitute a vast body of the backward section of our State. The variegated occupational structure, diverse peregrinational pattern, multiple socio-psycho and economic problems of these communities need empirical study for evolving appropriate ameliorative programmes. The physical anthropological studies have so far been a missing link in the research programmes of the Institute. The services of the subject matter specialists in the fields of Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, Industries and Education who provide necessary technical data are indispensably complementary for preparation of not only socially accepted but technically sound programmes as well as to evaluate the performance of development schemes. It is to meet this situation and to cover hitherto untouched<sup>s</sup> avenues of research that the Institute will chalk out its<sup>f</sup> future research programmes.

It is also proposed to start training programmes for Statutory tribal leaders viz., (a) Members of Standing Committees of Tribal Panchayat Samithis, (b) Presidents and Vice-presidents of Tribal Panchayat Samithis, and

Tribal legislators so as to acquaint them with various constitutional privileges, Tribal Welfare programmes and equip them with necessary knowledge and skills to discharge their duties efficiently.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE ADVISORY BOARD  
OF TRIBAL CULTURAL RESEARCH AND TRAINING  
INSTITUTE HELD ON 20-3-1970

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1. Review of the action taken on the Resolutions of the last meeting:

Advisory Board noted the action taken by the Institute on the minutes of the last meeting. At the outset the Chairman explained the functions of the reconstituted Advisory Board to the members. While reviewing the action taken on the minutes of the last meeting the Board made the following observations:

RESOLUTION NO:3: It was felt that the revival of regular training programme need not await the concurrence of the Government of India. The State Government may therefore be requested to permit the Institute to start courses in anticipation of the approval of Government of India if at all necessary. The Zonal Director, Backward Classes Welfare, Madras also said that Block Development Officers and other Extension staff of the State Government may be trained at the State Tribal Institute only as the Government of India vide their letter No. 6/16/66-TI, Department of Community Development, dated 15-11-66 have handed over the Central Institutes to the respective State Governments.



RESOLUTION NO:5: It was pointed out that the question of obtaining bonds from the trinees to serve in the tribal areas for a stipulated period will not arise that instead the Government may be requested to instruct all the Heads of Departments to ensure that the trained officers are posted in tribal areas for a minimum period of 3 years.

RESOLUTION NO.6 (a) Peripetatic training programme for tribal leaders.

The Zonal Director, Backward Classes Welfare, Madras expressed the need for defining the term 'Tribal leader'. The Member-Secretary informed that the term "Tribal Leader" refers to Sarpanchas, Panchayat Members and Traditional leaders. The General Manager, Girijan Co-operative Development Corporation pointed out the need for imparting training to Gram Karnams and munsifs in the development administration. Member Secretary informed that this category is already included in the regular training programme of the Institute.

(b) Pre-coaching to candidates belonging to Scheduled Tribes for I.A.S., I.P.S. etc: The Head of the Department of Sociology Osmania University informed that Osmania and Andhra Universities have been conducting pre-coaching classes for I.A.S. I.P.S., etc. He suggested that the tribal candidates who are desirous of appearing for I.A.S., I.P.S. Competitive Examinations may be given boarding grants by the Tribal Welfare Department for training in the coaching



centres of the two Universities. Board endorsed this view and advised the Institute to ascertain from Andhra and Osmania Universities regarding details of their coaching schemes.

RESOLUTION NO.8: While appreciating the provision made by the Institute for the grant of scholarships in Linguistics, Prof. N.S. Reddy suggested the necessity for awarding scholarships in the following order of priority of subjects:

1. M.A. in Linguistics.
2. M.A. in Telugu with Linguistics as one of the subjects.
3. M.A. in one of the regional languages.

Board agreed to this suggestion.

RESOLUTION NO: 9:-While discussing the need for survey and investigation under Area Development Approach, it was felt that a D.O. letter may be addressed to Sri Bhide, Jt. Secretary Planning Commission to send detailed instructions on the scheme of Area Development Approach and other particulars on the subject.

RESOLUTION NO.10:-Zonal Director, Backward Classes Welfare, Madras opined that the payment of remuneration is not in vogue and it goes against the tradition of healthy research. The Board agreed with this view and suggested to supply twenty five copies of reprints free of cost to the contributors instead of payment of remuneration.



2. Presentation of Annual Administration Report of the Institute for the year 1968-69.

The Chairman observed that where the scientific opinions were offered by the Institute on the study of castes and communities, it was not necessary to indicate the detailed views given by the Institute. While discussing the work turned out by Employment cell of the Institute, the Chairman expressed that all the Government Departments of the State should inform the Tribal Welfare Department the Employment particulars of Scheduled Tribes. In a similar way Government of India may also be requested to furnish the employment data to the department. In this connection he emphasised the need for exempting the under-matric tribal candidates from registering their names in Employment Exchanges, as they will not be in a position to understand the intricacies of official procedures. The Zonal Director, Backward Classes, Madras pointed out that the tribals are exempted from the registration in the employment exchanges in Rajasthan Government. He pleaded that the tribal candidates of Andhra Pradesh may also be exempted from the registration. The Board felt that the Rajasthan experiment should be studied. Zonal Director promised to furnish the copies of the orders of Rajasthan Government. Further Zonal Director pointed out that the information regarding employment should be deleted from the Administration Report of the Institute. The Chairman suggested that the remarks on the Administration Report may be sent by the members within two weeks after which the report may be submitted to Government.

The Chairman desired that a comprehensive scheme on employment of



Scheduled Tribes may be prepared by the Director of Tribal Welfare for consideration of the Government.

3. Reconstitution of sub-committee for Research Programme.

The Advisory Board agreed to form a Sub-Committee with the following members for reviewing and advising Research Programmes of the Institute.

1. Head of the Department of Anthropology, Andhra University, Waltair.

2. Joint Director, Cultural Anthropology, National Institute of Community Development, Rajendranagar.

3. Director-In-Charge, Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad.

4. Reconstitution of sub-committee for training programmes:

The Advisory Board agreed to form a sub-committee for training programmes with the following members to advise on the training programmes of the Institute:

1. Director of Training, National Institute of Community Development, Rajendranagar.

2. Zonal Director, Backward Classes Welfare, Madras.

3. Head of the Department of Sociology, Osmania University, Hyderabad.

4. Director-In-Charge, Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad.

5. The Revival of the Training programme for category I and II officers.

The Advisory Board, while emphasising the need for revival of the training programme for category I and II officers, resolved to request the Government to revive the training programme without waiting for the approval of the Government of India.

6. Training programme for members of Standing Committees of Tribal Panchayat Samithis.

The Chairman appreciated the idea of starting separate training programme for the members of standing committees and said that the sub-committee for training programme may work out the details of training programme such as duration, syllabus, teaching techniques etc.

7. Training programme for tribal M.L.As, M.Ps, Presidents, and Vice-Presidents of tribal Panchayat Samithis and Voluntary workers.

The Board accepted this proposal and decided to name it as an Orientation course for tribal M.L.As, M.Ps. etc.

8. Selection of Research projects for the year 1970-71

The Board selected the following Research projects for study for the year 1970-71.

1. Survey of Indebtedness and remedial measures.
2. Study of the problem of Tribal unrest in the agency areas particularly in Srikakulam Dist.
3. Study of the subsidised and Govt. Tribal Hostels.
4. Study of Employment of Scheduled Tribes.



9. Presentation of year wise list of problems decided by the Advisory Board for Study and those actually studied by the Institute with details of cyclo-styled or printed reports.

While reviewing this subject, the Chairman observed that the publications of the Institute should be supplied to non-official members also. Further a brief gist of each research report may be prepared in Telugu language and supplied to the non-official members of the Advisory Board.
10. Revision and enlargement of the publication of the Institute entitled 'The Tribes of Andhra Pradesh'.

The Board agreed for the revision and enlargement of the publication entitled the Tribes of Andhra Pradesh.
11. Fellowships to Research scholars in the field of tribal welfare.

The Board accepted the proposal. The Chairman observed that the subjects for study should be selected in consultation with the Director, Tribal Cultural Research and Training Institute, Hyderabad and the Head of the Department of Universities concerned.
12. Resumption of subscription to Eastern Anthropologist and subscription to important Anthropological/Sociological journals.

The Chairman expressed that there is no objection to subscribe for the journal but he observed that the Advisory Board is interested only in policy matters and other matters of detail need not come upto the Board unless specifically asked for.
13. Supply of cyclostyled copies of the subject-wise list of books in the library and circulation of monthly acquisition lists of the library to the members of the Advisory Board.

The Board accepted the proposal and decided to circulate the monthly acquisition lists of the library to the members of the Advisory Board.



14. Qualifications to be prescribed and the procedures to be adopted for recruiting personnel to the different cadres of the Institute and also the Dept. of Tribal Welfare.

The Head of the Department of Anthropology, Andhra University Waltair, said that candidates with Anthropology subject should be given preference for Research posts in the Institute and suggested that a selection committee may be formed for recruiting personnel. The Board desired to know the existing procedure.

15. Printing of Institute's Research Projects.

The Board strongly felt that the Government may be requested to accord permission to the Institute to get its Research works printed at the Andhra Pradesh Text Book Printing Press on top priority basis or at the private Presses by relaxing relevant rules in favour of the Institute.

16. Any other subject.
