

Report on the Jarawa expedition held between 194
2nd and 4th of September 1936.

As a member of the Pilot Project core-group I joined the contact expedition which contacted the Jarawas of the Middle Andaman on the 3rd and 4th of September 1936. On the 3rd, the contact point was Foul Bay point where about seventeen members of Jarawa community including men, women and children were contacted. On the 4th, the contact point was Yaadi Ta point where about twenty-nine Jarawas including the seventeen contacted on the previous day. In addition to the linguistic information which are of special interest to me I could also observe the following general cultural traits practiced by the Jarawas.

1. Most of the people are seen with their body being painted with a cream coloured clay called uwada (which is common among the Onges also).
2. Some children are seen with their head being painted with a red coloured clay called aa!aam (which is also common among the Onges).

[The significance of painting cream coloured clay and red coloured clay is yet to be clarified]

3. Most of the people are wearing a necklace called taakuulaume made out of white or red coloured thread.
