

used for collecting, carrying and keeping coconuts and bananas. In addition to these baskets, a wooden container called uhuu is also seen at the contact point.

12. At the yaaditaa point we could see some of their temporary huts. Around the hut-site are seen pig skulls, turtle bones and turtle shells. Also remnants of oven are seen. This tells that they cook their food and eat while staying in these huts.

13. For cooking and drinking purposes they use stream water flowing nearby the temporary huts.

14. Both father and mother are seen carrying the infant children on their back with the help of a thin flexible tree bark called eeuu stripped from a particular variety of tree.

(This is common among the Angas also)

15. It is also observed that the girls take care of their younger ~~only~~ infant siblings when their parents are involved in collecting coconuts and bananas.

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
