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around his waist. The shot he was wearing at the time of rejoining with his tribesmen might have been taken away from him. His whole body was now painted with red coloured clay.

(After the removal of shot and painting of red coloured clay necessitated ^{for} his rejoining is yet to be ascertained)

4. we were taken by the Jarawas to their permanent huts nearby the shore. They are different in shape and size from the temporary huts which we saw during the previous expedition at the Yaadika Point. They are constructed on a lofty, rocky place, probably, to protect themselves from the fury of sea-waves. In and around the hut we could see the acts of ignorance committed by the Jarawas. Among the gift articles presented to Enmen, those such as drawing materials, torch lights, battery cells etc about whose ~~utilit~~ utility they ~~were~~ are ignorant ^{of} were seen strewn and scattered away in an irretrievable manner. But the gift articles such as knife, file, nail, rope etc about whose utility they are aware of were hidden inside the huts.

(These items are carried with us as special gift articles to Enmen. Unfortunately they could not reach him)

5. One of the Jarawas named moobi etlaadla took me into his hut. A large number of pig skulls called moobu etlaadla hanging from the roof, a number of finished and unfinished bows and bow-strings kept inserted between the railings of the roof,
