them and studying their condition, life-style and behaviour.

The participants unanimously agreed that broadly the policy of slow and steady assimilation also known as the policy of "integration" should be adopted in respect of the Primitive Tribes, particularly the Jarawas and the Sentinelese. The avenues of development should be pursued within the broad frame-work of the "Tribal Panchsheel" with emphasis on the implementation part of it where all kinds of implications as well as precautions are to be adhered in the best interest of the tribals.

All the experts were unanimously of the view that our present understanding of the Jarawa society was not sufficient enough to warrant any long-term policy measures at this juncture. It was, therefore, suggested that a six months' pilot project should be carried out to have more and deeper insight into the socio-cultural, material, health, nutritional and language aspects of the Jarawa tribe. For the purpose, the experts suggested the following steps:

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
