Kindly refer your Memorandum No. IV\_3/AAJVS/93\_TW/(PF)/346 dated 7th June, 1993 on the subject mentioned above and to inform you that this is not the first occassion that the clothese to the Andamanses are arranged. The clothese are arranged from the very insception of the settlement and as a matter of fact the entire process of stitching is done by the HQs only and do not have any waxxx idea about the formalities done in the past occassion.

In this connection it may not be out of place to mention that I have been posted at Strait Island as Plantation I C to look after the orchargeds there and my duties and responsibilities has already been fixed by the samithy seperately, but on my joining there, I have been entrusted the duties of Social Worker and maintenance of Multipurpose co-operative societty besides my own works and as result I am fully enaged in the settlement. As there is no regular Social worker posted, the Sr. Social Executive posted at Port Blair shall co-ordinate and ensure procurement of indented materials/services from Department required in the settlement vide item No.4 of duties fixed on him by the Samithy (copy enclosed for pady reference). In this connection it is also needless to mention that in S/Island except a Multipurpose co-operative society where ration articles are sold to the tribals, there is no other source in which the required clothes can be stitched and as a matter of fact whatever things required for the settlement is required to be arranged from Port Blair only. Although the clothes are sent to S/Island, the stitching has to be done at Port Blair by the local Tailors as there is no Tailors available at S/Island. So knowing all these affairs the clothese have been sent to strait Island which I hope will be a extra burdan imposed on me asx when there is a S.S.E. available at HQs and he is directly involved for the cordination of the settlement works. It would have been in the fitness of thing the formalities would have been done at Port Blair as done in the past to avoid loss of

Dole.

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
