It has also been noted in the integrated report at page 4 that when the Jarawas camp near the ATR the children and young boys are invariably on road on foraging activities expecting items from the non tribals. In this context, this kind of behavior on the part of the Jarawa children in trying to get the food items from the non tribals on the ATR needs comparison with the traditional / usual role of children in the foraging activities in the Jarawa natural habitat.

Languages:

7. At page 5 of the integrated report it has been mentioned that most of the *young boys* of 10 to 20 years of age have picked up Hindi. There is no mention about the girls with regard to picking up of Hindi. It may be worthwhile to record this aspect also as it is significant to understand the change in the behaviour which could be gender specific.

Keeping pets:

8. The integrated report at page 5 mentions that the dogs have started recently accompanying the hunters to the forest on the hunting expeditions. In this context, further information with regard to the role of the dogs particularly in the hunting expeditions would be desirable. Such observations could be compared with similar observations in respect of other primitive tribes like Onges and Andamanese.

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
