

The number of poachers who have been caught in recent months is a testament not only to the commitment of the Coastguard but also to the extent of the problem. However, we remain extremely concerned that local poachers, who are equally dangerous to the Jarawa and Sentinelese, are not being targeted with the same vigour. We know that local poachers are regularly going into the Jarawa reserve to hunt for wild pig, which is essential to the Jarawa, and that fishermen lay their nets close to the shore of the Jarawa reserve.

homes and onto their shores, risking disease, violence, dependency and exploitation.

On Little Andaman, overhunting by settlers has severely diminished the population of wild pig, which is so important to the Onge tribe. Reports from the Jarawa suggest that they are already finding it much harder to catch wild pigs than in recent years. We urge you to ensure that poaching is stopped before it is too late.

The caption that goes with one of these photographs says, 'The place is little fished, catches are waiting for you. The two fishermen, who join us, come regularly around the island. Founded 1969 Some even spend the night at a safe distance from the shore...'

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
