

plot the regular camping sites of the Jarawas. The orders related to issue of 'Pass' for entering tribal areas, has been rationalized. The revised instruction on this matter, is annexed as **Annexure 'I'**. The Administration has also introduced a Plan Scheme for protection of the primitive tribes in the Annual Plan 2004-2005. Under the Plan, it is proposed to plant fruit bearing trees, such as, papaya, sapota and banana within the Jarawa Tribal Reserve. The patrolling along the sea coast adjoining the Jarawa Reserve will be augmented in order to prevent infiltration from routes other than ATR. The Administration proposes to provide health care in their own habitat. A copy of the order is annexed herewith as **Annexure 'J'**. In order to reduce the interaction between tribals and non-tribals engaged in collection of NTFP, such as, Dhup, etc., the Administration proposes to deal with illegal collection under the relevant provisions of Indian Penal Code, Indian Forest Act, 1927 and the A & N Islands Fisheries Regulation. The Andaman Adim Janjati Vikas Samity (AAJVS) has been revitalized by posting an experienced officer as Executive Secretary. The mobility of the staff of the AAJVS has been improved by providing them two wheelers for patrolling along the ATR. The Administration has proposed amendment to the A & N Islands Protection of Aboriginal Tribes Regulation for registration of crimes within the Tribal Reserves at the Central Crime Station and also for making the offences cognizable. A High Powered Committee has been monitoring the protection
