

being cut is from the natural forest and plantation of teak etc. has taken place in the forest, which had been worked and approximating 40,000 cubic metres of wood is cut from the forest annually for the purposes of the small mills the total logging of wood being approximately 1,30,000 cubic metres per year. In the last two years, this figure has come down but the fact remains that instead of resorting to social forestry and thereby providing employment to the people in growing forest at the present moment the natural forests are being cut and the timber sawn.

Andaman & Nicobar Islands is one of the hot spots and is in the eco-fragile area and has, therefore, the eco-diversity thereby has to be preserved. For this, it is essential that the natural forest is protected and re-generation allowed to take place.

We are also informed that the existing saw-mills have a subsisting licence valid till 30th March, 2003. The saw-mills and the other wood-based industries in the Andaman & Nicobar Islands are not permitted to cut the trees and supplies to them are made only by the Government itself or through its Corporation. Some of these saw-mills and industries have logs of wood and sawn timber in their
