3. Prevention entry of Jarawas in the settlement villages:

It has been decided to provide additional police force to the areas, from where the Jarawas frequently enter the villages provided villagers construct structures in those areas. After the structures have been constructed and handed over by the police, the additional police force will be posted so as to prevent entry of the Jarawas into the villagers.

4. Distribution of ration etc. to the Jarawas :

As many as 10 (ten) volunteers have been appointed to watch movements of the Jarawas and help to send them back to their habitats. They will be given orientation training in handling the Jarawa situation by the Tribal Welfare Department and Anthropological Survey of India, Port Blair. They are being paid honorarium @ Rs. 1000/- per month.

The committee constituted for distribution of gifts to the Jarawas has been re-constituted with Assistant Engineer, Construction Division, APWD, Kadamtala as Chairman instead of Assistant Commissioner, Mayabunder to avoid inconvenience in providing gifts to the Jarawas.

5. Disproportionate expenditure towards pay & allowances of the staffs :

There are altogether 42 staffs on the pay roll of AAJVS, of which the following staffs viz. a Tribal Welfare Officer-1, Plantation In-charge-1, Pharmacists-3, Ward Attendant-2, volunteer-10, daily rated mazdoor-9 deployed for welfare of the Jarawas. The total expenditure towards welfare and development of the Primitive Tribes was Rs. 116.43 lakheduring the financial year 2000-2001, Jarama, Amballout of which an amount of Rs. 38.76 lakhewas spent towards pay & allowances of Shorpino, Organ the staffs and the remaining amount of Rs. 77.67 lakhe towards other welfare measures.

So far as the Jarawas are concerned there was a provision of Rs. 13.00 lakhs against which an amount of Rs. 23.40 lakhs including pay & allowances of the staffs was spent. It may be pointed out here that the staffs appointed to look after the Jarawas also indirectly contribute to their welfare. Unless there is adequate trained manpower, the welfare programmes for the Jarawas will not be successful.
