The **updated status report as on 15.10.2014** on the agenda points of  $11^{\text{th}}$  12 &  $13^{\text{th}}$  IDA meetings relating to Tribal Welfare department is furnished as under:

## 11th IDA Meeting:

**Agenda point**: Minister of Tribal Affairs stated that the Jarawas, Shompens, Onges, Great Andamanese and Sentinelese belong to the Country's natural heritage. Their population is dwindling and all measure would be taken up to protect them.

Consequent on the direction of the Govt. of India, Ministry of Tribal Affairs an Empirical study on Jarawas was undertaken by the A & N Administration with the assistance of the Anthropological Experts, the Tribal Welfare Officers and Janjati Sevaks of Andaman Adim Janjati Vikas Samiti (AAJVS). The research team submitted its findings entitled "Jarawa movements in relation to time and space" to the Administration. The study report has suggested for setting up of 'Hot Spots' in the Jarawa tribal reserve to ascertain the free will of the tribe. Following places viz Bada Balu, Jhao Kona, Tirur and Potatang in South Andaman and Phooltala, Lewis Inlet, Lakra Lungta and Bluff Island in Middle and North Andaman has been identified as 'Hot Spots'. Out of Eight Hot Spot, six namely- Jhao Kona, Tirur, Bada Balu, Potatang, Lakra Lungta and Phooltala has been set up in relation to different Jarawa habitats/concentrations have become functional with delivery of welfare schemes as well as interactions between the Jarawas and officials of AAJVS.
