

	PPP mode.	<p>Governor's D.O. letter dated 18.08.2010 for the following:</p> <p>(a) Permission to set up Medical college which is 4 kms apart from the existing hospital (G.B. Pant Hospital);</p> <p>(b) Permission to set up the Medical college in partnership with a "not for profit" private party.</p> <p>☑ A proposal has also been submitted to Ministry of Environment & Forest, Govt, New Delhi for Environmental clearance vide letter No.1-6/MC/DHS/08-09/156 dated 29.12.2010.</p> <p>☑ For this purposes, a meeting was held with officials of Ministry of Home Affairs, Medical Council of India, Ministry of Health and officials of A&NI under the chairmanship of Member Secretary. It was decided that the A&NI Administration will send a comprehensive proposal to the Medical Council of India (MCI) seeking ex-ante approval for the setting-up of the College in two pieces of land separate by a distance of about 4 to 5 kms under public-private partnership (PPP). The proposal must indicate the reasons for the College being spread over two separate pieces of land, the logistics which would be provided to ensure smooth movement of students from one campus to another and also provide information on the occupancy in the G. B. Pant Hospital over the last three years. MCI will expeditiously consider the application of the A&NI Administration and allow ex-ante approval (preferably before the meeting of the Standing Committee of the IDA on the 3rd May, 2011). However, the approval will be conditional upon obtaining a post-establishment certificate/clearance of fulfilment of all other conditions as are normally required in terms of the guidelines of the MCI.</p> <p>☑ Following the decision taken in the meeting, A&NI has sent a detail proposal to MCI.</p>	<p>A&NI to set-up a medical college cum hospital in Port Blair.</p> <p>☑ Ministry of Health and family Welfare will sympathetically consider the request and send a reply to Lakshadweep and A&NI Administration by 7th June, 2011.</p>
27.	Enhancement of rice quota for APL category	<p>The present allocation of rice by the Government of India is not sufficient, since it is based on 2001 population figure of 81000 families. Presently there are 108205 ration card holders under APL, BPL and AAY.</p> <p>☑ The requirement of food grains on the scale of 35 Kg (27 Kg Rice & 8Kg Wheat/family/month) is 45446 MT per year. Against the requirement of 45446 MT per year allocation is only 31372 MT per year.</p> <p>☑ Due to short allocation of food grains, ration under APL category have been reduced from 7 Kg to 5 Kg of rice per adult per month and from 3.5 Kg per child to 2.5 Kg per child with effect from 01.09.2009.</p> <p>☑ Presently, the entire quota of food grains has been lifted except 926 MT of rice and 146 MT of wheat for BPL families allotted on 06.01.2011 for which validity period for lifting is 30.06.2011. With the additional allocation of food grains,</p>	<p>The Standing Committee was informed that the matter has now been resolved. Accordingly, for the present, no further action is required in the matter.</p>
