For instance, it can be stated that anyone who has been residing in a village for more than one generation (25 years) and owns either a piece of land or a house for this entire period shall be deemed to be an ordinary resident.</p>	<p>The Administration does not agree to this suggestion as in the Nicobar District the land is entirely under community ownership.</p>
