Mr Lieutenant Governor,

Survival is extremely concerned for the welfare and future of the Jarawa. Despite they have begun to make friendly contact with outsiders. We urge that their ownership of their land must be recognised and that their territory must be protected from encroachment and poaching. We believe that the only way that this necessarily achieved is to restore their reserve to its original 1957 limits, close Andaman Trunk Road and relocate to outside of the reservation the settlers and living in forest camps within this area.

Survival urges your administration to allow the Jarawa to make their own choices about their future; they should not have another way of life imposed upon them. Notions that a nomadic, un-colonised lifestyle is more 'backward' or 'primitive' than settled agriculture and that the Jarawa should eventually assimilate into mainstream society are, I'm sure you'll agree, outdated and similar those held by the colonial British authorities in India. Survival urges you not to repeat the mistakes that the British made with the 'Great Tribes' and Dhangars, must, lest that have lead to their virtual annihilation, but to allow the Jarawa to decide their own future for themselves.

Finally, the 'Sentinelese' have shown by their hostility that they do not wish to be contacted. Survival urges your government to respect their right to remain uncontacted and to take any further attempts to contact them.
