

Janjati Sevaks of AAJVS have been deployed at different contact points to safeguard the interest of the Jarawa and ensure that they are not exploited in any manner. Besides the field staff of AAJVS alongwith the Jarawa Protection Police, Forest officials carry out joint patrolling in the Jarawa Reserve area to prevent their exploitation by any one , which has proved effective.

That in the context of revised Buffer Zone Notification, a series of "Hot spots"^{or contact points} have been identified as suggested by Dr Vishvajit Pandya, well known Anthropologist who is one of the members of Group of Experts constituted by ~~Group of Experts~~ in connection with review of Jarawa Policy. ^{e/} Those "Hot spots" now will be used to monitor the pattern of movement of Jarawas, engagement, intervention between officials of AAJVS, Police, Forest, Health and the Jarawas so that effective protection and
