horticultural or any other activity, such encroachment should be stopped at the earliest...

As to the third point of reference, namely, whether the Jarawas need to be restrained from moving to the Andaman Trunk Road, the Expert Committee expressed the view that the Jarawas for the last two or three years had started coming out on the said road moving along it sometimes on foot and occasionally boarding vehicles and at different places they have constructed hutments very close to the road and such change in behaviour on the part of Jarawas clearly demonstrates some change in their attitude which another historical process and cannot simply be wished away. It was opined by the said Committee, the risk which was initially there for the Jarawas coming out on the roads is not so much now as it was initially and if some education and training are imparted to the Jarawas and non-Jarawas, the risk can be minimised further. It was further opined by the said Committee that the Jarawas need not be restrained from moving on the Andaman Trunk Road as large part of the said road passes through such territory. Restricting their movement on the Trunk Road would mean restricting their movement in certain parts of the area under their occupation. It was further opined, as the Jarawas are living together in small groups consisting of a few family units and they camp at one place and go around hunting, fishing and gathering and group of Jarawas are camping close in the Trunk Road, they make use of the Trunk Road for faster movement to reach
