

7. All the prescriptions of the Jarwa Policy should be observed in letter and spirit. If operational problems are experienced, only then can moves be made to change/amend the prescriptions.
8. Poaching in Jarwa territory must be strictly controlled by the Police, the Revenue and the Forest Departments, with the help of the AAJS staff. In order to facilitate this, the Jarwa territory must be visibly demarcated. Persons caught with pig meat or any other item that is clearly specific to the Jarwa territory, outside the reserve, especially in eating houses, must be booked under the Wildlife Protection Act.
9. The Joint Secretary, NCST agreed that the provisions of the Prevention of Atrocities Act, 1989 will be examined and suggestions conveyed to the A&NI Administration for use against violators of the PAT and related Government orders.
10. The help of premier national institutions would be taken to prepare plans and protocols for sensitizing the settlers around the Jarwa reserve; for recording the traditional knowledge of the Jarwas including their system of ethno-medicine; and for non-invasive research.
11. Individual oriented research must be discouraged as these are done generally for career advancement, and in the process, no institutional memory is created. Consequently, the findings of such research are not available to the A&NI Administration or concerned
